Brass Band.—A full brass band, conducted by Mr. Magnus Olsen, will perform this evening, in front of the Theatre.

Change of Address.—It will be well for all parties having business with Bro. J. H. Hart, the emigration agent at New York, to note that the number of the P. O. box in that city has been changed from 3937 to 18.

Departed.—Sister Mary Ann Leaver, of the 8th Ward, died at her residence yesterday, at 2 p.m., after a life of honor and usefulness, in her 72nd year. The funeral will take place at the 8th Ward Assembly Rooms to-morrow (Thursday) at 12:30 p.m. Friends are invited.

More Traffic Wanted.—The passenger train on the Utah and Northern line is increasing so rapidly that it is proposed, as soon as practicable, to place on that line two additional passenger trains, which will necessitate a corresponding enlargement of the rolling stock of the road.

Returned Home.—Last night, Hon. W. H. Hooper and his two daughters, Misses Hattie and Libbie, returned home, after an absence in the East of three months. They visited a number of the leading cities in the States, and greatly enjoyed their trip, getting back in good health.

Material on Hand.—The sand used in the mortar for the building of the Manti Temple, is obtained from a series of soft sandstone, which goes through a grinding process for the purpose. There is sufficient of this stone on the ground to last the masons during the whole of the present season.

An Escaped Maniac.—Hugh Lyon, the lunatic, escaped from the Asylum on the east bench last night. This is the mentally deranged individual who cut up all sorts of wild antics in the eastern part of the city a short time since, and acted in a threatening and belligerent manner in the 6th Ward. He is a maniac of the dangerous type and his present haunts should place themselves in immediate communication with the police authorities, that he may be placed securely beyond the practicability of doing mischief.

A Cranky Customer.—This morning Robert Johnson was before Justice Ryan to answer to the charge of wanton destruction of property. His defense was somewhat singular. Yesterday and the day before, he went to the establishment of Mr. John W. Small, took out considerable quantities of salt and threw it into the ditch. When interrogated as to the object of this proceeding, he said it was done that he might subsequently be enabled to catch salt fish.

He was fined \$10 in order to see what effect a ten days' incarceration in the cooler would have in restoring his mental balance.

Coming from the North.—This was the first day for the Conference on the northern railroads to go into effect, and as a consequence the train was loaded with people coming to the metropolis to attend the great gathering. We learn that the backwardness of the farming season will not have the effect of deterring our northern friends from coming to Conference. On the contrary, the prospect is that the attendance from Cache Valley will be the largest on record.

It is a mistake on the part of the railroad company not to have the reduced rates go into effect sooner than the fifth, as that arrangement crowds the trains beyond their legitimate carrying capacity. But it is a still greater mistake to limit the time of returning home to the north to the 10th, because nearly all the passengers will want to stop to the last day when it is made so close to the termination of Conference, and we doubt very much if the Utah & Northern Railroad could command sufficient rolling stock to take all home who would want to go on that day, and if passengers are compelled to stop over in Ogden they would be on expenses and render the company liable for damages.

Appreciating these facts we understand that Superintendent Geo. W. Thatcher has telegraphed to Omaha to the officials there, with a view to having the time limit for the return of those taking advantage of Conference rates extended to the 12th.

Saratoga To-Night.—The many friends of the Home Dramatic Club will be pleased to learn that the new arrangement of their programme enables them to present both Saratoga and Our Boarding House during Conference week. These two plays are without doubt the chief successes made by the Club in their past season, and no better selection could have been made to please their country friends.

The Beef Market.—Good beef is comparatively scarce in the market and correspondingly high in price. The rates being still higher in Chicago and other markets, the main cause of the scarcity and consequent high prices—shipping the cattle out—continues, and the tendency is likely to still be a little upward.

We understand that Mr. Whitney, a gentleman who has been largely engaged in the cattle traffic here for some time, shipped nine car loads to Chicago, only a few days ago.

The attention of the Utah grangers should be specially directed to cattle raising, which appears to be profitable just now. No difficulty in finding a good market. Save the calves where it is practicable to raise them, instead of killing them off, as is now too much the prevailing custom.

Humorous.—A certain merchant of this city, not far from the 15th Ward, has a bulletin board in front of his store, on which he marks the prices of such produce as wheat, barley, corn, etc. He is in the habit of reading said board, each day, with some original, or quoted humorous saying, phrase, or proverb, and recently had written thereon the following: "Never trouble trouble, until trouble troubles you." When spoken to, he remarked, that this was an original one, and that he was anxious to impart some grains of wisdom to the public, as well as sell them cereal grains.
