SHOCKING GUN ACCIDENT.

Little Sidney Jackson Shot and Instantly Killed at West Weber, Saturday.

Fatality Due to Careless Handling of Firearms-Rural Mail Carriers Appointed.

A sad and fatal shooting affray oc curred Saturday afternoon about 1:50 o'clock at West Weber, Weber county, as a result of carelessness, and on ac count of the same two familles ar bowed down in deep sorrow; and Sid-ney Jackson, the little 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Jackson, is lying cold in the arms of death.

The particulars of the accident as near as can be learned are, that during Saturday a son of Henry Reed about 14 years of age, the next door neighbor to the Jackson family, went cut in the fields west of the house duck hunting, and returned home shortly after 1 o'clock with some game. He stood his loaded gun in a room with the trigger up ready to shoot, he then went out into the lot near the use to help a young man fix a plow. While so employed the little Jackson boy and Bowman Reed, the 5-year-ol boy and Bowman Reed, the s-year-old son of Henry Reed, came into the lot playing. The two little fellows ran to the house and the Reed boy picked up the gun, saying they would go and **shoot** birds, and raising the gun, it is supposed to have exploded, the full load taking effect in the Jackson boy's breast directly over the heart, tearing terrible wound in the boy's breast, plercing his heart, it went almost straight through his little body. The force of the shot turned the boy al-most completely around, and he fell to the ground dead. Murray Jacobs, who was only a few rods away, was soon at the dead boy's side and with the aid of neighbors the little lifeless body was carried home. The grief of the mother is heartrending, as only about 15 min-utes before the accident she had per-

the little Reed boy is not old enough to realize to any great extent what he has done, but the boy's parents are censured for carelessly permitting their children to have such dangerous weap-

The sympathy of the entire community is extended to Mr. Jackson and family in their very sad bereavement. The funeral services over the remains of little Sidney were held at the West Weber meetinghouse this afternoon at 1 o'clock. Interment took place at the West Weber cemetery,
