He went to those localities for the purpose of in-vestigating the alleged blight, and says: "There is no blight in the beet fields this year. I satisfied myself on that point. Wherever I went I found the condition of the growing crop to be entirely satisfactory. The beets around Nampa, Idaho, where 3.000 acres have been put in, are now as thick as a man's wrist, and they are growing inxuriantly. The factory at Nampa will work them up next fall, for it will be ready by that time to begin operations. It looks as if there will be a yield of from 15 to 18 tons per acre, which is phenomenal. In all of Idaho perhaps 15,990 to 18,000 acres of land are in beets and it must be said that there was never a beiter be said that there was never a better prospect for an abundant harvest. The farmers are more than pleased at the outlook. #### State Industrial School Asks for Appropriation of \$20,000.

Mayor E. M. Conroy, T. B. Evans, H. S. Joseph, H. H. Thomas and C. R. Hollingsworth, representing the State Industrial school, met yesterday with the state board of examiners, and asked for an additional appropriation of \$20, 600 to carry that institution through the balance of the year. It has been found that the \$25,000 appropriated by the last legislature is inadequate to meet the current expenses of the school, owing to an increase in the number of inmates of about 25 per cent over pre-vious years and a decided increase in the price of provisions and supplies. The industrial board was asked to make an application in writing, item. izing the requirements of the school, and the members were informed that the matter would be duly considered in the near future.
