New York, Aug. 3 -- Acting for the president, Third Asst. Secy. of State Peirce today communicated to Baron Rusen, the Russian ambassador, and Mr. Takahira, the Japanese minister, the official program for the formal presentation to the president of the Rusgian and Japanese pienlpotentiaries to the Washington conference. This program has for weeks been a subject of much study on the part of the president

As the president's representative, Mr. Peirce will accompany Baron Komur and Mr. Takahira and their suites t the pier of the New York Yacht chil at East Twenty-third street at 2 o'clock Sunday morning, where the delegation will board the protected cruiser Tacoma, Comunder Alexander A. Harp com-

ma, Comander Alexander A. Harp com-manding, and the vessel will immedi-otely start for Oyster bay.

Half an hour later Mr. Pelree will perform a similar ceremony for Mr. Witte and Baren Rosen, the Russian plenipotentiaries, and their suite, who will go aboard the protected cruiser Chattanooga, Commander R. F. Nichol-ten commanding.

Mr. Peirce will board the converted yacht Sylph, which, steaming rapidly chead, will take position at the front of the column. Arriving at Oyster hay about noon, the 'peace squadron' will anchor, its arrival being loudly heralded by the firing of an ambassadorial salute of 19 guns.

A buffet luncheon in the cabin of the Mayflower will follow. At its conclusion the Japanese mission will take leave of the president and board the Dolphin. Mr. Peirce will go aboard the cruiser Galveston, and the president will then take leave of the Russian mission and go ashore, again receiving a salute of 21 guns.

Under convoy of the cruiser Galveston, Commander Cutler commanding, with Mr. Peirce aboard, the Russians on the Mayflower and the Japanese on the Dolphin, will sail for Portsmouth. The squadron will steam slowly, so as not to arrive there before 10 o'clock Monday

Neither has been acted upon and the question of federa jurisdiction will be presented to the supreme court. A DASTARDLY OUTRAGE. Attempt to Blow Up a Ship in Mid-ocean.

San Francisco, Aug. 4.—An attempt to blow up a ship in mid-ocean has been reported by Capt. C. Tousee of the French ship Ashieres, which has arrived here from Swansea, England, loaded with coal. He left that port in January last and six weeks later when far out at sea, a dozen capped fuses such as are used by miners to explode charges of dynamite, were discovered in the hold of the ship among the coal. Had one of the fuses become ignited by a shock in a part of the hold where coal gas had accountulated, the ship would undoubtedly have been blown to atoms. Two or three of them had exploded, but fortunately at points where there was no gas, and consequently no damage was done.

If Mr. Witte finds that he is able to place a loan in the United States, and it is believed by prominent financiers that if the terms are satisfactory, he can do so, the aspect of the Russfan cause may be materially changed when the peace plenipotentiaries make known

their positions to each other.

"Heretofore it has been believed that no Russian loan could be floated in this country unless it were based on a cessation of the war and the promise of internal reforms in Russia. Informa-tion was given Mr. Witte last night, however, that indicated the willing-ness of at least one, and possibly two prominent banking houses to consider the terms which Russia would pay for negetiating a loan."


