BOND ELECTION DRAWING NEAR

Indications are That the Issue Will be Voted.

He said: "I am certainly in favor of issuing the bonds for this pur-If we are going to have a here, with all the conditions of proper sanitation and healthy environments, we must have a good water system. We need it and must have it or our town will be a very poor one indeed. I believe in reasonable taxation because that is the source of public revenue for the operation and maintenance of pub-lic institutions and utilities.
