'It is not to be supposed that Congress intended that the commission was per-sonally to do with work or come neares to the direct agencies in doing the work than the directory of a railroad comes to the construction of railroad work. and we may assume therefore that it was quite within the congressional inwas quite within the congressional in-tention that the commission might, for convenience and rapidity of action, aft-er formulating the general plan of work, delegate to a committee or com-mittees the doing of work in detail, the result to be reported subsequently of course, to the full commission. The commission should, therefore appoint an executive committee, to be constitut-ed and empowered as hereafter stated. ed and empowered as hereafter stated." DETAILS OF SECRETARY'S PLAN

DETAILS OF SECRETARY'S PLAN The secretary then states in detail his plan for the division of the work into departments and reasons therefor, all of which details are accepted and set forth in the president's order. The letter concludes as follows: "The change of headquarters and power from Washington to the 1sth-mus will doubtless require a radical change in the office of the commission in Washington. I am quite sure that greater economy and more satisfactory methods of accounting can be secured greater economy and more satisfactory methods of accounting can be secured than now exists. Machinery for pur-chase of supplies and a force sufficient to maintain a duplicate set of acts and the necessary correspondents must necessarily be maintained in Washing-ton, but little else is needed. But these changes may safely be left to the commission and executive commit-tee, as newly constituted. "I beg to suubmit herewith the res-
