

## GLAVIS PROPOSES TO PUBLISH FACTS

Writes President Believes He Has Been Misled Concerning Coal Lands in Alaska.

### STILL DANGER OF MONOPOLY.

Will Tell It All—Pinchot Has No Statement on So-Called Controversy With Ballinger.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 29.—L. H. Glavis, late chief of the Seattle field division of the United States land office, has written a letter to President Taft in which he says he will publish soon the evidence in the Cunningham coal land cases. Mr. Glavis' letter follows:

The President, Sir: I have told before you all the essential facts in my possession regarding the official conduct of certain cases by the department of the interior concerning coal lands in Alaska. As chief of field division directly concerned and because of the tremendous values involved, I felt my personal responsibility most keenly. The evidence indicated that a great syndicate is trying to secure monopoly of the coal fields through violation of the law. I presented it to you over the heads of my superior officers in order to bring about the enforcement of the law which, in a measure, would conserve those coal lands to the people at large. I deemed it my duty to submit the facts to you, and I cannot omit them.

Since there may be now even greater danger than the title to these coal lands will be fraudulently secured by the syndicate, it is no less my duty to my country to make public the facts in my possession concerning which I firmly believe that you have been misled. ### PINCHOT CAUTIOUS.

Avalon, Catalina Island, Cal., Sept. 29.—By wireless to Los Angeles. After a two-weeks' sojourn in San Francisco, a return journey, 40 miles off the coast of southern California, Gifford Pinchot, chief of the United States bureau of forestry, arrived here last night. Concerning the Ballinger-Pinchot controversy, Mr. Pinchot said:

"It is a mystery to me why I have been called the Ballinger-Pinchot. I have no right. Although I am not yet in position to say definitely, I have every reason to believe that matter will be adjusted satisfactorily as soon as I can return to Washington next week."

"At present I am waiting for a letter from President Taft, which I expect to receive before Saturday. Further than this I have nothing to say. My duty is a public official demands that no random statements be made."

"Have you made any statements concerning the report sent to the president by L. R. Glavis relative to the Alaskan coal lands case?" Mr. Pinchot was asked.

"I have not," he replied. "My views in regard to this matter have been misunderstood both by the press and by others."

It is understood that Mr. Pinchot has not the slightest intention of tendering his resignation as chief forester. He will return to Washington, D. C., about Sept. 30.

### BALLINGER EULOGIZED.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 31.—Speaking at the chamber of commerce last night Postmaster-General Frank H. Hitchcock brought the guests cheering to their feet by a eulogy of Secy. of the Interior Richard A. Ballinger.

"Richard Ballinger's name is as unimpaired as the snow of your mountain ranges," he declared with great earnestness. "As well attempt to smoke the foundations of the great Mount Rainier as to assail the character of the secretary. I am proud of the representation that the city of Seattle has in the cabinet. When it came about that the right man was here, for the cabinet the right man was here, a man who had been mayor of your city, high in his profession, a man whose character for square dealing was above question. ## GOV. JOHNSON OF MINNESOTA DEAD

"Well, Nora, I Guess I'm Going: We Have Made a Brave Fight," His Last Words.

### VITALITY WAS WONDERFUL.

At Times He Seemed to Wish for the End—When It Came His Wife Collapsed.

St. Paul, Sept. 31.—Gov. John A. Johnson died at 2:35 a. m. today in St. Mary's hospital, Rochester, Minn., and in this city flags on all public and many private buildings are flying at half mast.

On the streets and wherever men meet are heard expressions of deep sorrow.

Early advices from Rochester today are that no arrangements have been made as to the disposition of Gov. Johnson's body, which still is in the hospital, but it is taken for granted that the body will lie in state at the capital here.

Frank A. Day, who was private secretary to the governor, went to the Kable home in Rochester this morning. He will remain in Rochester today, and some time this forenoon will see Mrs. Johnson and arrange for the funeral.

Mrs. Johnson is reported by Miss Margaret Sullivan, her most intimate friend, as bearing her great sorrow bravely.

Gov. Johnson's life hung continually in the balance until the end came. So frequently did his condition change alternately for better and then for worse, that his physicians, ever hopeful, but none too optimistic, were able to say at no time since the operation was performed that the governor had more than an even chance for his life. At his bedside when the end came were Mrs. Johnson, Miss Margaret Sullivan, his friend, Drs. W. J. and Charles H. Mayo, Dr. C. F. McNevin, Frank A. Day, the governor's private secretary; Fred J. Lynch, his personal confidential memorandum, and the Misses Jamie and Schiller, the governor's nurses.

Dr. W. J. Mayo stated that there were no traces of blood-poisoning and that the immediate cause of death was exhaustion and heart failure.

In being the fifth day after the operation, the one when the crisis usually arrives in a case of this kind, unusual symptoms were felt by the physician yesterday.
