

JOHN MITCHELL MAKES STATEMENT

Has Not Sent Out or Authorized
To Be Sent Out Posters Giving
His Political Views.

DEFINES ATTITUDE OF LABOR.

United Mine Workers Not Committed
To Any Party—Advises Each Man
To Study Questions for Himself.

Indianapolis, Oct. 20.—John Mitchell, former president of the United Mine Workers of America, today furnished the following statement to the Associated Press:

MITCHELL'S STATEMENT.
"During the past few days I have received numerous inquiries from secretaries of our local unions in reference to a poster containing an enlarged likeness of myself, below which is printed what purports to be an interview with me bearing on the present political situation. Some of these letters are written in a spirit of criticism, while others are commendatory and request that additional posters be mailed for distribution.

"It is obvious that these posters have been received by many, if not all, of the secretaries of our local unions; it is apparent that at least some of our members believe that they were sent out by me, and the assumption is that I am attempting to dictate, or at least to influence the manner in which our members should vote.

"In order to remove any misunderstanding that may exist I take this means of informing our members that I have not mailed or authorized any one else to mail to any member or officer of our union, or to any one else, any poster containing my likeness or giving expression to my political views, except so far as they may be contained in the official circulars authorized by the executive council of the American Federation of Labor.

"Only a short time ago a weekly paper published in the city of Buffalo printed what purported to be a telegram signed by me, declaring unequivocally for one of the presidential candidates and with equal emphasis advocating opposition to another. That telegram, which has been given wide circulation, was not written by me nor by my authority. I never saw it nor heard of it until it appeared in the columns of the publication referred to.

HESITATED TO SPEAK.

"I have borne patiently with this misrepresentation and have hesitated to say anything by way of correction because I feared that it would so much furnish another opportunity for garbling what I said, and thus place me in even a more embarrassing position, and might convey the impression that I was not in full sympathy with the working people to secure remedial legislation for the wrongs of which they complain.

"But matters have gone so far that I cannot, in justice to my own conscience, remain silent while others use my name in this unauthorized manner. I am abundantly anxious to speak for myself and I object to the unwarranted liberties being taken with my name. Therefore, I avail myself of this means of communicating to all who may be interested in this expression of my views.

"As I understand the policy of the American labor movement and the action of the United Mine Workers of America, it is that the organizations of labor are not committed to any political party; the workmen of America are endeavoring, so far as lies in their power, and without regard to political affiliations, to elect to public office bona fide members of trade unions or other candidates who are known to be in sympathy with the political and industrial reforms necessary for the protection and preservation of the interests of the wage-earners.

"To this end I have written letters of recommendation, and will write others urging our fellow workers to support trade unionists and friends of the trade union movement who have been nominated for official positions."

Mr. Mitchell here mentioned several men whose candidacy for the lower house of Congress he favored, and continued as follows:

personal, and, to a lesser extent, the agricultural and even the leisure classes, are as well and so numerous represented in our state and national legislature, the wage-earner should also be represented by a group of strong men from the ranks of the workers whose training and experience are such as to enable them to present in an intelligent and forceful manner the needs and requirements of that great division of society which is least able to protect itself. When all factors are thus represented we can expect such general legislation as is essential to the welfare of the whole nation, and such special laws as are necessary to protect the interests of each separate division.

"I am sure that I shall not be charged with partisanship when I advise each man to examine carefully the principles and policies of the candidates, to consider seriously the effect of the election upon the nation as a whole and upon that division of society in particular to which he belongs; and, having done this, it is his duty to cast his ballot in accordance with his judgment and with the dictates of his conscience.

"Over and above all, trade unionists should ever keep in mind the necessity of preserving inviolate the strength and integrity of the unions. When the election is over and the excitement and enthusiasm incident to it have passed away, regardless of which party has been victorious, regardless of who is elected to be president—the organization of labor, as heretofore, and as henceforth, will be to the workingmen the bulwark of their liberties."

Three Members of Late President's Cabinet Speak at Bryan Meeting in New York.

MAYOR McCLELLAN PRESIDED.

Letter from John Bigelow, Friend of Lincoln and Tilden, Urging Bryan's Election, Read.

New York, Oct. 20.—Three members of the cabinets of the late President Cleveland by presence and speech at a big Democratic gathering here tonight sought to demonstrate beyond peradventure that the Democracy of Tilden and Cleveland is lending its support and endeavor to secure the election of William J. Bryan to the presidency.

The occasion was a mass meeting under the auspices of the Bryan and Kern Business Men's Association, at Carnegie hall, and seated on the platform were former Gov. David R. Francis of Missouri, secretary of the Interior under President Cleveland, and Grand Harmon of Ohio, former attorney-general, and Hilary A. Herbert of Alabama, President Cleveland's secretary of the navy. Word was received from Richard Olney of Massachusetts, who held the portfolio of secretary of state under Cleveland, that he would be unable to be present because of a previous engagement.

A NOTABLE ASSEMBLY.
Carnegie hall contained tonight a notable assembly of Democrats, some of whom have, in the past, been the party's councils since Cleveland's administration and the Bryan leaders and others on the platform expressed their delight at the presence of these men and whetted the fine edge of political memory by recalling the campaign of 1896 and 1900, when many Democrats of prominence in this same hall made it known that they had come to the parting of the ways. Taking as a theme the present campaign issues from a business standpoint, the chairmen of the administration in speeches of forensic force brought ringing cheers from the auditors that closely packed the hall, with declarations that Mr. Bryan's election would mean business stability and an uplift to industrial well being.

Mayor George B. McClellan presided at the meeting and read a letter from the former Gov. John Bigelow, friend and statesman, a friend of Abraham Lincoln and Samuel Tilden, urging the election of Mr. Bryan. The mayor was introduced by the president of the Bryan and Kern Businessmen's association who asked his auditors to vote the Democratic ticket. Mayor McClellan declared that the present administration had been responsible for the panic and then brought his hearers to outbursts of applause with the reading of Bigelow's letter.

EX-ATTY.-GEN. HARMON.
Former Atty.-Gen. Judson Harmon, now Democratic candidate for governor in Ohio, was tendered a rousing welcome when introduced as the first speaker of the evening. The names of Bryan and Cleveland were loudly cheered by the crowd. Mr. Harmon said, "Democrats who withheld their support or gave it to the Republican party in 1900 now see that in the end they injured the cause they had at heart. They believed that party had gone wrong on the money question, so they elected a man who they knew had done the same way and was only brought about by the necessity of the campaign. They added the candidate whose chief distinction was an almost fanatical devotion to the idea of taxing all men in order to put up with a few of the most harmful to the people of all heresies and therefore the most hateful to Democrats."

"The Democratic party is a united party," said the former secretary, "and today is as strong and complete a fighting organization as under Tilden. We will win a victory this year."

HERBERT BELIEVES IN BRYAN.
Mr. Herbert said that while he did not support Mr. Bryan in his early campaign he had since become better acquainted with him and he believed that Bryan's election meant a restoration of good times under the administration of true Democracy. The speaker asserted that the talk of panic in the event of Bryan's election came from those who had caused the present panic.

EX-GOV. FRANCIS.
Former Gov. David R. Francis of Missouri, who spoke next, was given a tumultuous reception. Mr. Francis said in part:

"I favor the election of Mr. Bryan in this contest because I think his success would do more to promote the general welfare of our people than would that of his opponent. I believe there is ground for Mr. Bryan's claim that he is the advance agent of prosperity."

"I have business interests in various lines. My obligations are outstanding. I am interested in undertaking whose success depends upon the restoration of credit and the improvement of the business of the country. I feel no alarm over the prospective installation of a Democratic administration at Washington no more than I would of the continuation of the present policies of the present administration. Those who prophesy that business would not continue to improve if the Democratic candidate should be elected, are without foundation."

Both are Republicans.

REPUBLICAN CAMPAIGN PLANS

Final and Great Whirl Will Be in Indiana, Ohio and New York.

NO CHANCES WILL BE TAKEN.

From Now Until Election Day Every Available Speaker of Na'l Prominence to Speak in Pivotal States.

New York, Oct. 20.—Mr. Taft will leave Cincinnati tomorrow night and begin at once a tour of Indiana. He will close the campaign with a speech at Youngstown, O., Monday night, Nov. 2.

The impression that the Republican national committee has virtually taken charge of the campaign in Ohio is erroneous. The impression doubtless grew out of the statement made today by Chairman Hitchcock that the national committee had arranged to send a number of speakers into the state. The national committee has done this after a full understanding with the state committee of Ohio. So the matter was explained at the national headquarters. The national committee is particularly interested in the Ohio situation because of the many though disputed reports of disaffection in several sections of that state, but the committee insists that it has no doubt of the result in the state as a whole. It now proposes, it is said, "to clinch the matter."

Mr. Taft will appear at all the day meetings which have been announced in his itinerary in Indiana and Ohio, but he will not speak at any of them. This arrangement has been agreed to by the state committees in Indiana and Ohio.

The object of this is to satisfy the crowds that are expected to attend, and to save Mr. Taft's voice for the night meetings that have been announced. This statement was authorized today by Chairman Hitchcock. Chairman Hitchcock will leave for Chicago tomorrow or Thursday, but will be in that city for only two days. After that he will return to New York, and remain here until after election.

After a conference late today with State Chairman Woodruff, Mr. Hitchcock said that while he had never had any doubt about Mr. Bryan, he was more confident than ever that Taft and Sherman electors would have a great plurality in the state, and was just as confident of the re-election of Gov. Hughes.

The final whirl of the Republican national campaign will occur in Indiana, Ohio and New York. From now until the day of voting every available speaker of national reputation will be heard in the three states, which both parties regard as pivotal. The national committee has arranged to throw the following speakers into Ohio: Mr. Taft, Postmaster-General Meyer, Secy. Garfield, Secy. Straus, Senator Oliver, Senator Howard, Representative Foster of Vermont, and Representative Longworth of Ohio.

The campaign in Indiana will also be conducted with all the vigor the national committee can put into it.

PROBLEM IN MAIL ETHICS.

Washington, Oct. 21.—A problem in mail ethics, whether the name of the city and that of the state should be printed on the name line in addressing envelopes has figured considerably in correspondence with the postoffice department and the fact has been brought out that persons who address envelopes with typewriters prefer the single line while the great majority using the pen place the name on separate lines. For some time past the division of dead letters has been sending out a card showing a model form of addresses, the name of the city and state appearing on the same line. In the discussion of the matter, the adoption of this form of address the weight of opinion favored a change to the two line plan. It was also stated that placing the name of the city and state on separate lines facilitated the work of the postal clerks in distributing letters. Accordingly in the new address cards which shortly will be printed, the name of the city and state on the same line in addressing, and that of the state will be on separate lines.
