An Alaska Bill-More about the Cadetships.

The Committee on Commerce are discussing a bill for the leasing of Alaska as seal fisheries, thus carrying commissioners. out the suggestion of the special agents who visited those fisheries. The bill permits the killing of a hundred thousand seals annually, unless the Secretary of the Treasury considers it necessary to restrict it to a smaller number. All the privileges granted by the act are to be given to the Alaska commercial company for a period of 20 years; they agree to pay a do lar and a half of internal revenue tax for each skin shipped and to give reasonable wages for the labor of natives' also to furnish them with food, goods and clothing at reasonable rates, to maintain schools for the education of children, and not sell spirituous liquors to the natives. The company are to give bonds in three hundred thousand dollars for the performance of their duties. The government has not subjected any expense on behalf of said company to Congress, and reserves the right to amend or repeal the bill at pleasure.

Secretary Boutwell opposes the bill; but appearances indicate that some such measure will pass.
