

**To Remove Films.**—A correspondent of the *Southern Homestead* writes:—"Having seen a number of remedies for taking film from horse's or cattle's eyes, I'll give the method that I have practised for years without failing in a single instance. —A Kilkenny paper says that General de Lamoriciere, now engaged in organizing the army of the Pope, is not only an Irishman, but a native of the county of Kilkenny. He was born in 1806, at the "Islands of Urlingford." His real name is Morrissey, and the late Mr. William Morrissey, shopkeeper, Urlingford, was his uncle.

—St. Tovar, the newly elected President of Venezuela, has formed a new ministry, and chosen Gen. Paez, now a resident of New York, as minister of war.
