Shot in the Neck.—Late on Saturday night, P. Young was shot in the neck, the ball passing forward and lodging under the left jaw, inflicting a painful, but not fatal wound. He lost a great deal of blood. After being taken to the City Hall, he was conveyed finally to St. Mark's Hospital.

Frank Humphries was arrested, and appeared before Justice Spiers, to answer to the charge of doing the shooting. He states that, on Saturday night, some person came to the window of the room where he and his wife were sleeping, and insisted on getting in. After warning the party off for the fourth time he fired a random shot out of the window, for the purpose of scaring the fellow away. He was surprised to find subsequently that the shot had taken effect.

It appears that Young was intoxicated, and was under the impression that he was getting into his own room.

Humphries waived an examination and was held to answer to the grand jury in \$500 bonds.

Held For Robbery.—This morning Fred Hampton, a former saloon keeper of Ogden, was up before Justice Hampton on a charge of stealing a valuable watch and chain from Ambrose Greenwell, of that town. The two were in company on Saturday, and Hampton borrowed his companion's coat and vest including his watch and chain. The two then took train ostensibly for Ogden, but Hampton left it at Woods Cross, and came back by the freight. Greenwell, finding he had been duped, also left the train at Kayville and came to this city. Hampton was arrested, but, in the meantime he had borrowed \$25 from Mr. Gentsch, leaving the watch with that gentleman as security.

The accused was held in \$500 to answer to the grand jury. The property carried off by Hampton was valued at \$250.

Lost in the Mountains.—The Ogden Herald learns that, last Monday Bengt Nelson, a Swede, started from Lynne, Weber County, intending to reach the top of one of the mountains east of this place. He traveled on until he found his way blocked by snow and brush. He then retraced his steps homeward, but lost his way and wandered about until he reached Waterfall Canyon.

He continued his way through the canyon till he reached Gesler's house where he arrived on Thursday morning, with his feet and hands in a sadly frozen condition. He fainted as soon as he entered the house.

Mr. Gesler and family procured what restoratives they had on hand and administered to him. He still lies in a precarious condition of prostration, from which it is doubtful if he will recover.

A Fraud.—On Saturday a fraud named Charles Wright, a stranger in these parts, rented a store from Stringfellow Bros., and hired a number of workmen to make alterations, under the pretense that he was going to set up business with two carloads of goods, that were to arrive shortly. He next called on Mrs. Furster, of Second South Street, from whom he borrowed \$30. He also got \$23 from a man named Poulson. He then cleared out. Officer Calder got the railroad men to look out for him, and he was arrested on the train at Cottonwood, by deputy sheriff Fowler, of Utah County.

He was taken before Justice Raleigh to-day, plead guilty and fined \$60.

Notes From Pioche.—A correspondent writes from Pioche:

We have had beautiful weather thus far. Some of us are anxiously waiting for the "iron horse" to come to this part of the country, which we believe will aid our mining interests.

A number of us attended a Christmas ball at Bullion, which we enjoyed very much, with the exception of some disturbance by some quarrelsome drunken hoodlums from Panaca.

I learned while at Bullionville that the "pinkey" was over at Panaca, just across the creek, nearly opposite from Godde & Company's store. I understand that the disease is not the virulent type. Dr. G. Edwards of Panaca thinks it is comparatively mild.

An Astonished Chinaman.—This morning a woman was before Justice Spiers charged with committing an assault on a Chinaman who rejoiced in the name of Sam Wan. It appears that the complainant went to collect a wash bill, and he said that instead of his pay he got a blow with a hatchet. He brought no evidence to sustain the accusation and the accused was discharged. When Sam was told he would have to pay \$7.25 costs, he presented a striking picture of mingled indignation and astonishment.

The Chinese Must Go.—The reliability of the southern dispatches is frequently illustrated. On Friday we received a telegram, stating that eleven Chinamen had been killed by Apaches, which led many to mutter impressions upon the heads of the bloodthirsty treacherous "red." Later on, this information was contradicted and the atrocious deed was committed by white men working on the railroad, and the white roughs caught it and now the wires tell us the ill-fated eleven were simply killed by telegraph and are consequently still manipulating famous pans of boiled rice with the indispensable chop-sticks. Chinese graders are tough and appear to be able to stand being killed in a good many ways without receiving any bodily injury.

Ready Deal.

BROWNVILLE, Texas, 9.—Two lieutenants of the Fifth Mexican Infantry, Manuel Valas and Vincento Cano, yesterday fought a duel with pistols at Chilpanango. Valasco shot Cano through the lung, killing him instantly.

Shooting Afray.

SHREVEPORT, 9.—An account was received here of a severe skirmish at Westport, between J. W. Moore and a party who occupied his store and a besieging party outside. The house was riddled with bullets. During the siege, the windows being shot out, Robert Perkins, J. Dykes and Simon Merrill were killed and several others wounded.

The Contested Seat.

NEW YORK, 9.—The Tribune's Washington special says: In the matter of the Utah contested seat case, a paper has just been filed out of thirty-six members composing the General Assembly of Utah, and paid out of the Treasury of the United States, thirty-two are high officers of the Mormon Church, bound by their oath to obey the dictates of the Church in all things, secular as well as spiritual, and twenty-eight are living in polygamy in violation of the law of Congress of 1882. These figures, at the least of them, place in a curious light the statement recently given out by Bishop Sharp and ex-Delegate Hooper, the polygamy in Utah is dying out.

Fatal Explosion in a Coal Mine.

MAJOR CHURCH, Pa., 9.—A terrific fire damp explosion occurred this afternoon in mine No. 10 of the Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company, at Lansford. Thomas Parry, of Georgetown, fire boss, is missing, and believed to be dead, and eight men and boys badly injured, among the latter are Edward Galtz, from Gearytown, three men named respectively Reybach, Burns and Kline, and five others from Jamaica, whose names are unknown; one of them had his back broken and legs have legs and arms broken and are badly burned and concussed. The explosion was caused by a fall of coal breaking a safety lamp in the hands of fire boss Parry.
