During the past week the volume of business transacted on the floor of the Salt Lake Stock and Mining Exchange consisted of the transfer of 27,509 shares of stocks, for which was paid the sum of \$38,955.16, which is an increase over the previous week. Tintic stocks were the leaders in the week's trading and of them May Day stands at the head of the list, something over 50,000 shares of the list, something over 50,000 shares having changed hands. The stock has been a surprise to some, as it has recorded good stiff adwinces, going from around 14 cents up to 19½ cents. Uncle Sam Consolidated, too, has been in demand and came near reaching the haif dollar mark. Mr. Schley is a member of the banking firm of Moore & Schley, who founded the American Smelting & Refining company, and is a heavy stockholder in the Yampa.

The United Bingham has sold the remainder of its treasury stock, 125,000 shares, at a price said to be above 13 cents per share. The name of the purchaser is not given out, but it is surmised that Clarence McCornick is the man who landed the block. The property adjoins the Shield and it is expected that within the next 100 feet the tunnel will encounter the ore body opened by its neighbor.

The policy of expansion continues at the Boston Consolidated, where the forces have been doubled. The ore shipments have been increased from 150 to 250 tons daily and could be further increased were the smelter prepared to handle more. promoted to the superintendency, SMELTER STRIKE OFF.

Passage of Eight Hour Law in Colorado Influenced Action.

Influenced action.

Denver, Colo., March 25.—At a meeting of the local Smeltermen's union last night the strike in the Globe and Grant smelters was declared off by unanimous vote. The passage of the eight-hour-law recently by the legislature influenced the action. The members believe that the provision of the law which says that all men coming in confact with noxious gages shall work. contact with noxious gases shall work only eight hours, can be interpreted to only eight hours, can be interpreted to include all smelter men, for the reason, they say, that the smelter fumes and gases are so penetrating as to affect persons and property in the vicinity of smelters, and certainly must have ity of smelters, and certainly must have effect upon the men employed in and around the plants themselves. Eight hundred men employed in the Globe and Grant smelters struck on July 3, 1903, and, according to the statement of Secretary Haywood of the Western Federation of Miners, but two percent of this number returned to work. The Grant has been idle continuously since the strike, although the Globe has been operating. The cause of the strike was the refusal of the demand of the men for an eight-hour day.

CAPT. CURTIS NAMED.

Mas Been Appointed Superintendent of American Flag Mine.

President T. F. Singiser of the American Flag mine of Park City has appointed Capt. William M. Curtis to succeed the late John G. Rhodin as superintendent. Curtis is an old-time resident of Park City and was at one time the owner of a portion of the territory now controlled by the American Flag company. The appointment of Capt. Curtis is a good one. The mine is shortly to be equip-ped with more powerful holsting ma-chinery.

RICHMOND-ANACONDA.

Lonsers Are Greatly Encouraged Over

Present Conditions. Manager John Dern of the Uncle Sam Consolidated returned from Tintic this morning and brought in some fine this morning and brought in some fine looking carbonate ore from the Richmond-Anaconda mine, where leasers are working. The men have about a half carload out, and as soon as a full carload is made up will make a shipment. Indications were last night that a good body of ore was about to be broken into.

Some Bingham Changes. On the first of the month there will be a general readjustment of the official staff at the Bingham-New Haven mine. Frank Taylor, the superintendent, will retire, to be succeeded by C. E. Gillan, who comes from the Utah & Eastern mines at St. George. Mr. Taylor will give his attention to the Central Bingham. Mr. Wicks, the assayer and bookkeeper, has also resigned, and will be succeeded by W. H. Hendrickson, from the Gemini mine, Tintle. Mrs. Kent will also give up the boarding house, but it is not known who will succeed her. UTAH COPPER'S GREAT MILL.

Directors of Company Have Decided on the Location for Proposed 2,500-ton Plant,

SITE NEAR CARFIELD BEACH

Has Been Chosen-Will Mean Building of a Railroad-Opportunity For Salt Lake Route.

The location for the proposed 2,500ton mill to be built by the Utah Copper company during the present year has been selected. A decision was reached yesterday and Manager D. C. Jackling will commence immediately to arrange the necessary details and organize his forces to carry out the plans for this big undertaking.

The Bingham canyon site, which was looked upon as a favorable location by members of the official staff, has been abandoned and the directors have concluded that the site east of the old Garfield Beach resort has decided advantages in its favor. Consequently, it

vantages in its favor. Consequently, it has been selected.

In many mays the Bingham canyon site would have been preferable, but the gentlemen comprising the board of directors, all of whom have had wide experience in mine and mill operation, were careful to guard the future interests of the convents of the convents. were careful to guard the future interests of the company before passing judgment. The haudling of such an immense tonnage of ore would make it incumbent upon the company to build a system of retaining ponds in order that the slimes would not cover the farms and country below. While this plan might work out handsomely, yet there were certain and very grave dangers attached to it. When one stops to consider that the

When one stops to consider that the basis of concentration is from 22 to 25 tons of ore into one ton of concentrate, the magnitude of the dangers can be easily understood.

easily understood.

One big water spout in the mountains with its attending floods, might create great havoe, by sweeping out the retaining banks of the ponds and do just what the Utah Copper folks, and the citizens of the valley below do not want to happen. One heavy storm might do inestimable damage to the country by covering it over with tailings, and conditions might become so bad that the Jordan river would bebad that the Jordan river would be-

But with the plant located on the point of near Garfield, no such disaster can be anticipated. Here the company will have available all the water it needs. The ore will be brought down over a standard guaged railroad, the length of which would be from 12 to 15 miles.

It was intimated during the day that the Salt Lake Route might figure in the construction of this line, as it would give the road an opportunity to enter the biggest camp in the state, the traffic of which now goes entirely to the Rio Grande. It was pointed out that the Sait Lake Route could find an easy grade into the copper camp by leaving the main line four or five miles east of Garfield. The traffic which would come to the road from the Utah Copper company alone, would be no small item. But with the vast developments being made in Bingham, there is no telling what proportions it would grow into. Bingham is yet in its infancy, and a year hence it will be producing twice the tonnage it is now—if present plans are carried out. It is pretty well conceded by mining engineers who have made investigations there that the ore bodies already opened up in the district cannot be worked out in a generation. give the road an opportunity to enter
