The Cheyenne Leader of the 20th, says: This afternoon, Captain Egan and Major Robinson, both of the 2nd United States Cavalry, with a com-mand of 150 dragoons, and 150 citizens from the city and Cache a la Poudre, started for Beaver Creek, in search of the Indians who have recently been committing depreda-tions in this vicinity. If they do not find the object of their search on Beaver Creek, they will proceed south, to the Republican River, or till they do find Indians, in that direction. With this force, they are pre-pared to meet any band of Indians, in the district they are about to visit. They are accompanied by twelve baggage wagons."

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
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


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
