LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

ECHO CITY.—This interesting locality listens daily to the snort of the locomotive, and is becoming quite a steady going place, thanks to an active Justice of the Peace and vigilant constable. But a little time ago faro was openly played in every saloon, and in some of them two or three tables were being run; now the "fraternity" go it with closed doors and are rather "akeary" at that. Justice Livingston put his hand down on a few, committed two to the county court, and fined a number in \$25 and \$50. The result is a most pleasing change already; may it continue and grow more so. Echo will become quite a nice place after a little, when its gamblers follow the frail members of the softer sex in their hurried departure for White Pine!

POLICE.—Jacob Brown, for being drunk and disorderly, was this morning fined \$10.

INSANE ASYLUM.—We understand a petition has been presented to the Legislature, praying for an appropriation to be applied to building an Insane Asylum, in connection with aid from the county and city. We hope the petition will receive favorable consideration. J. Sherman has now been in custody for fifteen months; and yesterday the police had again to arrest Warren Fraser for lunacy.

INDIANS EAST.—Two men named John L. Cisco and Lewis Voorheis, killed by Indians, were buried in Denver on Sunday 17th, with Military and Masonic honors. Indians are reported around the border settlements on the plains. The Cheyenne leader of the 20th, says: "This afternoon, Captain Egan and Major Robinson, both of the 2nd United States Cavalry, with a command of 150 dragoons, and 150 citizens from the city and Cache la Poudre, started for Beaver Creek, in search of the Indians who have recently been committing depredations in this vicinity. If they do not find the object of their search on Beaver Creek, they will proceed south, to the Republican River, or till they do find Indians, in that direction. With this force, they are prepared to meet any band of Indians, in the district they are about to visit. They are accompanied by twelve baggage wagons."

END OF TRACK.—The locomotive on the U. P. R. R. reached Salt Point, about nine miles below the mouth of Echo, on Saturday. There will be a little detention there; but the cars are expected in Ogden in three weeks.

"Wahno."—We beg the indulgence of our readers to-day, for postponing the continuation of "Wahno," other matter crowding it out. It will appear to-morrow.

ACCIDENT.—A Brother James Maxfield, of South Cottonwood, was coming to town to-day with a load of wood, an express overtook him with the news that his little boy, between 5 and 6 years of age, had by accident almost cut off the foot of his sister, aged 4 years, with an axe. The messenger came on to town for Dr. Ormsby and Brother Maxfield returned home immediately.

SANTAQUIN.—Bro. David Holladay called to-day and gives a good report from Santaquin. Peace and prosperity prevail. The health of the people is good. The holidays passed with a general time of enjoyment. Considerable plowing has been done, and some Fall wheat sown. The settlement is enlarging, and there is room for still quite a number of families. Water is increasing, and next spring they will fence in another large farm. Such items of continued and tangible prosperity are very gratifying.

PUSHING AHEAD.—From Mr. James Lewis, just in from Weber Canyon, we learn that the work of grading is being rushed there with a will. The men are working night and day, at every practicable point from the mouth of the Canyon to Devil's Gate. Mr. James Livingston has an increased force of men on the cut at Sheep Rock. Mr. Lewis came to town to hire men, and sent a number out to-day, to work on Mr. T. Stewart's job. He fired off a rock blast, which will make him with twenty kegs of powder, will touch off another, with the same quantity on Thursday, and still another three days later, with thirty kegs. The work is required to be completed in about two weeks. There has been, comparatively speaking, no winter weather yet in the Canyon.

A CLEVER NOTION.—Among the multitudinous "Clever notions" which display the inventive genius of the nation is an exceedingly useful one, very simple and cheap, and easily carried in the pocket, bearing the name of the "Self Lighting Pocket Repeating Watch," one of which was laid out on our desk to-day by Professor Calder. It has a silver case in a circular form, about the size of a lady's watch, that with care will last a lifetime. The matches are in coils of prepared tape; the little instrument is easily worked; the matches cannot be ignited by accident, as the whole is required to be in the house, as Mrs. Toddles would say, that it seems they must come into general favor. Prof. Calder, a description in the Scientific American, and sent for one, which he got a quantity by express for sale.

SCHOOL MEETING.—Many of the school Trustees and school Teachers of this city met last evening at Sister Eleanor Pratt's School room. Supt. R. L. Campbell announced the object of the meeting to be the furtherance of the educational interests of the county. The introduction of the Deseret characters and readers in the schools was discussed and agreed to. The question of petitioning the Legislative Assembly to enact a free school code was mooted. Twelve Trustees from different wards announced that when their schools commenced the present winter quarter, all persons in the school district were invited to send their children to school and they would see that tuition fees were paid the teacher.

The Teachers appointed Saturday next at 9 a. m. for a meeting of all the teachers of the city, who will attend and be instructed in Deseret orthography.

LEGISLATIVE.

January 26th, 1893.
HOUSE.—House met at 10 a. m. A message was received from the Council announcing their passage of a bill for "An Act to amend an Act entitled an Act prescribing the manner of assessing and collecting Territorial and county taxes, and for other purposes, approved Jan. 20th, '88." Said bill was read the first time. The committee on municipal corporations and town sites, to whom was referred paragraphs 20 and 27 of the Governor's Message, pending to the treatment of convicts, reported that in consequence of the unsuitable condition of the penitentiary and the frequent extension of Executive clemency to convicts, they deem further legislation thereon unnecessary. Adjourned till to-morrow at 10 a. m.
