LOCAL BRIEFS.

Haley & Saunders of this city handed 760,638 sheep during the year, 80 per cent having been shipped to eastern markets.

Fests of water from City Creek and Fries's canyon were completed Saturday by City Chemist Harms, and found to be of "excellent purity."

W. J. (Lord) Talbot, the well known traveling man, gave a fine dinner party Saturday evening at the Wilson, which was followed by a theater party.

Harold Fabian of this city is a member of the Yale band club, and was with the club on its recent western tour, which extended as far as Denver.

"What Women Can Do to Make a Greater and More Beautiful Salt Lake" will be the topic for discussion at the tenth anniversary of the Reviewers' club, Feb. 6.

There was a good attendance yesterday afternoon at the Y. M. C. A. to hear Rev. E. I. Goshen speak on "Proving and Knowing." A quartet from the Orpheus club was present and gave some very fine songs.

The damaged street cars are being rapidly repaired at the company's barns. With the exception of the vestibules, which were entirely demolished at the colliding ends, the cars are not much injured.

A runaway horse belonging to some unknown party collected with a street pole Saturday night, on Seventh street near Second West streets, and was killed by the shock. The animal had broken away from its rig.

Mrs. Henry J. Robinson of Bingham, formerly a member of the Tuesday Musical and the Symphony club of Denver, is organizing a local orchestra, and will have the assistance of Prof. W. C. Clive and Fred Beesley of this city.

Deputy County Clerk C. S. Buckwalter and his brother, Roll Buckwalter, are now under quarantine at the isolation hospital with the smallpox. They were taken ill a week ago. Both have passed the danger point, and will be out when the quarantine period is up.

Company C, First regiment, will be organized next Friday night, in the state armory. The regimental officers have for some time been working up this company, and are now confident that it will be a success, particularly as the personnel of the command is of an high order.

Fred A. Hale has returned from his southern California trip, firmly believing that Stanford university is destined to become one of the greatest institutions of learning in this country. The \$100,000 chapel particularly impressed him, with the great bas relief in the gable.

The contractors at Saltair have been having trials and tribulations with the horses, as it is found that the salt water makes the horses' hooves so tender, it is believed that by watching and washing with fresh water, this difficulty can be obviated. It requires 15 horses to haul one of the great dredges.

Secy. Williams of the local board of the civil service commission, says that for 50 examinations ordered in this city for various branches of the service, not one candidate will show up. About the only examinations that attract any attention here are those for draftsmen, chemists, computers, postoffice service, janitors, Indian service and the like.

MENTAL HOSPITAL

HOME OF THE BEST

So Says Gov. Albert E. Mead of
Washington During His
Visit There.

HOW HE JUDGES CIVILIZATION.

Can Best Be Determined by the Character of Charitable Institutions
—In Ogden Today.

"The Utah State Mental hospital is one of the best appointed I have ever seen," declared Gov. Albert E. Mead of Washington, yesterday afternoon, after spending the day at the Provo institution.

"I have made a study of state institutions," he continued, and have watched them both in my own state and many others. It seems to me the state of civilization in a commonwealth is better judged by the character of its charitable institutions than any other way, and I consider the care of the unfortunate portion of a community to be the highest form of philanthropy."

WARMLY ENTERTAINED.

The party left Salt Lake at 8 o'clock in the private car of Gen. Supt. A. E. Welby of the Rio Grande system, which had been placed at their disposal. At Provo the party was met by Mayor J. H. Frisbie, Judge J. E. Booth, Postmaster Jas. E. Clowe, J. T. Farrar, John W. Farrar, Albert Glazier, State Bank Examiner, and R. B. Irvine, president of the Provo Commercial club. Carriages were waiting in which the party was conveyed to the mental hospital, where Dr. Calder and Mrs. Calder received them.

After a trip through the wards and about the grounds, luncheon was served to the visitors, following which brief talks were made by Gov. Mead, Judge Booth and Mayor Frisbie.

A dense fog made it impracticable to drive over the town, so the party went direct to the afternoon service at the Tabernacle, where Gov. Mead made a short address in which he emphasized the fact that state lines were only imaginary boundaries when it came to a proposition of carrying forward the great work of upbuilding the west.

PARTY PERSONNEL.

In the party were Act. Gov. and Mrs. C. S. Tingey and Miss Tingey, Gov. and Mrs. Mead and son, Secy. N. P. Nelson, former Gov. Geo. A. Black of Utah and Mrs. Black, State Fish and Game Commissioner John Shary, State Auditor and Mrs. J. A. Edwards, Frank Groesbeck, traveling passenger agent of the Rio Grande Western and press representatives. Their car was attached to the Sanpete Valley train, leaving Provo at 4:30 o'clock, and they arrived in Salt Lake at 6 o'clock. En route A. C. Nelson, state superintendent of public instruction, joined the party and came with it into Salt Lake.

IN OGDEN TODAY.

Gov. A. E. Mead of Washington is today the guest of Act. Gov. C. S. Tingey at Ogden, where the state reform school is being inspected. Gov. Mead is accompanied by Mrs. Mead and son, and a number of prominent local officials are also in the party. N. P. Nelson, private secretary of Gov. Cutler, is in charge of the visit.
