## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Principals Meet Tomorrow**—The postponed principals' meeting will be held tomorrow afternoon at the Lafayette school.

**Mrs. Bowenman Convalescent**—Mrs. L. S. Bowenman, daughter of the Baptist minister, was discharged from St. Mark's hospital yesterday afternoon, convalescent from an operation.

**The Coal Situation**—Local coal dealers report the supplies in fair quantity, with delays in delivery. There is no danger of any stringency unless a long stretch of severe weather comes.

**Escapes From Hospital**—Mrs. Edward T. Studdess, a Holy Cross hospital patient, escaped yesterday, and only in her nightgown. Deaf with a quilt thrown over her shoulders, she was later captured by the police, wandering about in a demented condition, and returned to the institution.

**Cutler Wins Distinction**—Harvey G. Cutler, son of Dr. Chester E. Cutler of this city who graduated from West Point last February, and was assigned to the artillery corps, has been promoted to the first lieutenant. He is said to be the youngest first lieutenant in the United States, as he is only 22.

**Salina Water O. K.**—State Chemist Herman Harms has submitted to Governor Cutler his report on the analysis of water taken from the city water system at Salina, Sevier county. This is about the eighth sample Mr. Harms has examined from Salina waterworks, and his report is that the water is of first class quality.

**Guardsmen Elect Officers**—H. company, First Infantry, stationed at Fort Huachuca, has elected its officers for the year. First Lieutenant A. W. Young, in place of Captain Bassett made regimental commissary; and First Sergeant A. Campbell was chosen second lieutenant. The election will be held next Monday night for first lieutenant, as there was a failure last night, to agree on a choice.

**Mrs. Lloyd to Lecture**—Mrs. B. T. Lloyd will deliver a lecture at the meeting of the Second Ward Relief society Thursday afternoon in the ward relief society hall.
