

NEW KIND OF FENCE.—Mr. John R. Remington, of Montgomery, Ala., (the inventor of the Remington Aerial Bridge), has patented a new and useful invention. It is a cement for making solid fences, as durable as granite, and at a very reasonable cost of construction. The chief ingredient is sand, and it can be easily manufactured by plantation hands. The cement panels are conveyed to the spot where the fence is to be located, and the two legs of each let into the ground like common posts. The cost to the planter is estimated at ten cents per panel of ten feet by five—four inches thick—far cheaper than the wire fence.

Viscount Frederick Adolphe de Gardinville, Knight of the Order of St. Louis, has just died, aged 113, at his country house near Hamburg. This officer was born on the 28th of January, 1738.
