ANOTHER ACCOUNT.

Great Falls, Mont., July 3 .- Train No. on the Great Northern was held up about 2:20 this afternoon near Wagner station, 196 miles east of Great Falls, by three masked men. They blew the express car to pieces with dynamite. tearing off the roof and sides down to the floor, and then forced the express messenger to open his safe, but it was empty

Without asking him to open the through safe, to which he did not have the combination, they shattered it with dynamite and secured the contents. It s reported that the booty was \$30,000, but this cannot be verified.

While the robbery was in progress a fusillade of shots was kept up along the sides of the coaches, forcing the passengers to remain within. Few ventured to look out. Morgan

English Liberal Split.

New York, July 4 .- The split in the liberal party is the one subject of discussion in British political circles, says the London correspondent of the Tribune. Every one recognizes that next Tuesday's meeting at the Reform club will be charged with destiny. The fact that the meeting has been fixed for a date ten days earlier than that of the Asquith banquet gives ground for the supposition that it had been carefully designed either to make the latter function impossible or else deprive it of any importance. In any case it is certain the meeting has not been called in the interests of the imperialist liberals. and possibly it was to consider their position in the face of this latest derelopment that Mr. Asquith and his followers have just met together in one of the committee rooms of the house of commons. At this gathering the cream of the liberal imperialist party was present. But no inkling of what occurred has been allowed to leek out, Mr. Asquith wisely keeping his own counsel.
