

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PRESIDENT TAFT

Duty of Executive to Welcome Every Instrument by Which Morals May be Elevated.

RELIGION AND PATRIOTISM.

Those Who Are Loyal to Their Church Are Certain to be Loyal To Their Country."

Portland, Or.Oct. 2.-President Taft loday preached another sermon. This seene had changed from the Mormon abornacle at Salt Lake City on Sunday last to the cornerstone laying of the First Universalist church in East Portland. The president handled the silver trowsl and worked hard to see that the stone was properly adjusted. His apparent earnestness in setting the stone called out great applause from the open-air audience.

The president referred to his various burch experiences and in concluding its remarks, haid: No church in this country, however

numble it may be, that preaches the doctrine of true religion and true mor-sity will lack my earnest support to make it more influential whenever op-northmity offers."

When the president had been intro-duced at the convnerstone laying by the Rev. James D. Corby, paster of the church, he said:

ADDRESS OF PRESIDENT TAFT.

"I don't know that anyone questions the propriety of my being here and officiating on such an occasion as this or that an explanation of any sort is called for. But I want to say that I believe it to be the duty of the president of these United States to welcome and to appropriate over instrument. dent of these United States to welcome and to support every instrument by which the morals and religion of the community may be elevated and maintained. Not long ago I officiated at the cornerstone taying of an orthodox Congregational church in Washington. Then I appeared in the puloit of a Jewish tabernacle at Pittsburg. But a few days ago I beiped to lay the cornerstone of a Catholic institution at Helena, Mont.

"And how it is my pleasure to as-

"And now it is my pleasure to as-st here today in laying the corner-one of this Universalist church which, like my own church, the Unitarian, is known as a liberal church. "Isem glad always to be present at such occasions as this, for I believe

that the cornerstone of modern civil-ization must continue, to be religion and morality."

and morality."

The president told some of his experiences with the Catholic church in the Philippines, and then said that on the occasion of his visit to Rome some two years ago he ventured to say to the pope that while in America the sentiment was strong for the principle of the separation of church and state, there was nothing in the American government or the American people that opposed the church or its highest that opposed the church or its highest development; that in no European country had the Catholic church grown or flourished as it had in America; that in this country the church received from the government and state officials nly that treatment accorded to every

only that treatment accorded to every other denomination.

"I added," continued the president, "that this was not to be taken as an indication that every government and state official was other than anxious to encourage the establishment and maintenance of churches and that their influence might be broadened throughout the land."

CHURCHES GROWING TOGETHER.

"I think we have reached the time when the churches are growing togeth-er, when there is less bitterness of denominational dispute, and that no matter what creed we may follow, the churches are beginning to realize that they must stand shoulder to shoulder in the contest for righteousness; that we all stand for the fatherhood of God

in the contest for righteousness: that we all stand for the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man

"I am an optimist. I believe we are much better today than we were 50 years ago, man by man. I believe we are more altruistic and more interested in our fellow-man than we have been at any time in the inst 50 years Of course, you hear from time to time of instances of selfishness and greed, but the only reason these instances are given prominence is because we condemn them the more and believe that in calling attention to them they will be made more and more infrequent.

"No church in this country, however humble it may be, which preaches the dectrine of true religion and true morality, will lack my earnest support to make it more influential whenever opportunity offers."

On his way to the cornerstone laying in the afternoon the preadent stopped by St Mary's Catholic school and from the stope of that institution made a brief address to a yardful of boys and girls. Mr. Taft was presented by Archolishop Christic and after congratulating the children on their rosy checks and "chubbinesse," said.

This is the first general excommunication of a city during the present pontificate.

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


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
