HIGHER WAGES IN IRELAND.—The rapid increase of emigration from the southern counties of Ireland is producing a result of which the laboring population cannot complain. The wages for farm laborers have lately reached the highest figure ever known in Kerry -twelve shillings to fifteen shillings sterling a week with board. In many parts of the county of Cork the rate is ten shillings, and as emigration continues as brisk as ever, labor is likely to command this price generally. For twenty years there has not been such an emigration from the port of Drogheda as at present.

REPORT OF GRAND JURORS,

JUNE 22, 1866.

To the Honorable Probate Court of Great Salt Lake County, Territory of Utah:

We, the Grand Jury of the United States, in Territory of Utah, in and for the County of Great Salt Lake, in attendance on the Probate Court, June term, A.D., 1866, beg leave to report: That we have, to the best of our ability, faithfully discharged our duty as Jurors and true presentments made of such crimes and offences as have come to our knowledge.

The Grand Jurors beg leave further to report, that agreeable to the suggestions of the Court in charging them, they have enquired into the conduct of the public officers of the County; the manner in which they discharge their duties, and of the care and attention given to public property belonging to the County; and find on examination that the Court House, in our judgment, should not be left day or night without a guard,—further, that the windows of the cells under the Court House used as a jail to confine prisoners, are too open and too much exposed

(Veryla opposite the Themler.) ander the Court House used as a jail to confine prisoners, are too open and too much exposed to safely seeure those committed; we think it also desirable that the windows on the first story above the cells, should throughout be properly shuttered and secured; further, in our judgment, better arrangements should be provided for the comfort of criminals while in the cells or jail in regard to their ledgings.

The Jury further beg to report that they also inspected the Penitentiary and enquired into the means furnished the Warden to execute the judgments of the Court on convicts, and on mature deliberation they feel to endorse fully the report made by the Warden to the Legislature dated June 6th, 1864.
