ONE SESSION OF THE EXCHANGE

Brokers Begin Recess Which Will Last Until Next Thursday Morning.

SIOUX CONSOLIDATED DOWN.

Utah Stock Figured Conspicuously in Today's Trading—Closing Quotations.

When the brokers left the pit of the Salt Lake Stock and Mining exchange shortly before noon, the Christmas recess began. There will be no call to-morrow or course, but on Thursday morning business will be resumed again at the usual hour. Some members of the exchange were in favor of laying off the balance of the week, but such a great majority were of the opinion that too many holidays would tend to their benefit, so the proposal did not receive much support.

Notwithstanding the fact that Uncle Sam Consolidated is not shipping a pound of ore and there is little likelihood of it for awhile, that stock opened unusually strong and sold as high as 42½ cents. It was ascertained from one of the directors of the company, however, that development work will proceed vigorously during the present quiet in the metal market. Sioux Consolidated, which enjoyed quite an upsurge in price during the past week, today closed on a sale of 3,000 shares at 47½ cents. Seven Troughs held its own, while Black Jack did business at 21½ cents. Columbus Consolidated sold down to \$2 and Crown Point at 16. Very little was done with the unlisted stocks. SOUIX CON. IS LOOKING BETTER

Ore Resembling That Produced in the Colorado Mine Encountered.

LOCATION ON 280-FT. LEVEL.

May Be Colorado Vein—What Thomas R. Cutler Says—Activity In the Stock.

This decision has been reached by a number of the larger mines, and it is expected that the system will be placed in effect in all of the mines where high grade ore is found, the readoption of the change room, say mine owners, is directly due to "high grading," which has recently become more pronounced than ever in the Cradle Creek district.

The initiative was taken by the Gold-en Cyclo company.

By the "change room" system is meant the compelling of miners to change their clothes after working their shifts in the mines. If so doing, it will be impossible for much high grade ore to be stolen.

MAJESTIC COPPER.

Plans Under Way to Resume Development Work.

An eastern paper contains the information that E. E. Abercrombie of the Majestic mines in Beaver county will arrive in the city about the first of the year, and that there is a likelihood that development work will be inaugurated again. The same paper says the company expects to realize considerable in the way of rentals from the miners. Possibly so. But the chances are there would have to be a good many changes made in the plant before it will ever be of much use to anybody.

E. E. Abercrombie, president of the company, has issued the following statement to shareholders: Your board of directors take pleasure in informing you that as a result of the vote passed by a large majority of the shareholders in the meeting of the company held in Portion, Mo., Nov. 19, 1907, they have been able to make arrangements to push the work at the property without calling upon the shareholders, and at the same time have protected your interests in every way.

With a small capitalization, with about 500,000 bonds, and a large block of stock in your treasury uninsured your company is in a strong position and with the resumption of work the development of the important strike of sulphide ore in the O. K. mine taken in connection with the ones opened up in the Old Hickory and Harrington-Hickory mines your company will be ready to take immediate advantage of improved conditions in the metal market.

SEVEN TROUGH ECLIPSE.

Manager Waits Believes It to be a Big Proposition.

Local officials of the Seven Trough Eclipse Mining company continue to get gratifying news from the front. Yesterday a letter from General Manager C. W. Morris contained the following significant statement:

"When it comes to great width of the veins, and for values in gold thoroughly looks good," said he, "and as development work progresses, it appears to be getting better right along. One of the drifts was in 55 feet and the other in 60 feet last Sunday and the character of the ore is very similar to that found in the great Colorado mine."
