follows: That it has for some years past been handling its business, both passenger and freight, in Salt Lake City under unfavorable conditions owing to the cramped condition of its terminals; that its passenger and freight traffic has steadily increased during the past five years, and during the last year was twice as large as it was for the was twice as large as it was for the year 1897. That under arrangements recently perfected the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railroad company is to make use of the passenger and freight terminals of the Oregon Short Line Railroad company, thus very ma-terially increasing the amount of freight and number of passengers to b-handled, and that in order to provide proper freight, passenger and shop terminals for your petitioner, extensive additions will have to be made to the switching trackage, shop plant and freight and passenger terminals and fa-

The said San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake railroad is engaged in the completion of a through line of rail-road from Salt Lake City to Los An-geles and San Pedro, Cal. That the line for its through traffic will be by way of Garfield Beach, Tooele City and points south over the recently constructed line known as the Learnington cut-off, and to enable it to conveniently enter the said depot with its through traffic over said road it is its intention to construct a line from the neighborhood of Buena Vista, about three miles west of Salt Lake City, practically due easi-ward intersecting Third West street in Sait Lake City at or near the southern boundary thereof, and thence reach the said station by means of the double track proposed to be constructed by your petitioner in said Third West streets hereinafter set forth. known as the Leanington cut-off, and
