

STRIKE SITUATION IS IMPROVING.

In St. Petersburg Things Are Much Better and Men Are Going Back to Work.

GOVERNMENT PROFITS BY IT.

Turning Situation to Its Own Account—Lots of Strikes But No Revolution.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 28, 2:20 a. m.—News of Gen. Kuropatkin's successful repulse of the Japanese advance comes most opportunistically. The belief exists that Field Marshal Ozama sought to take advantage of the Russian depression prevailing in the Russian ranks as the result of the Russian strike to launch an attack on St. Petersburg to launch an attack against Gen. Kuropatkin's right; but the Russian commander-in-chief has turned the tables, inflicting considerable loss on the Japanese and taking several positions Thursday and Friday.

In the editor's opinion anything like a permanent return to the policy of repression is impossible.

The Russian journalist says that Father Gopon told him Saturday night that the time had come when he could take off the mask and declare himself a Socialist. He said he knew the emperor would not be at the winter palace on Sunday to meet the workers, and that he had preached the contrary at the workers' meetings. The object, Father Gopon is reported to have said, was to open the eyes of the workmen and turn them against absolutism. Father Gopon's "sherebuta" is not definitely established, although he is said to be in the Shafarovskiy hospital wounded.

PREFECT OF ST. PETERSBURG. St. Petersburg, Jan. 27.—Gen. De Babin, chief of the gendarmerie staff, has been appointed prefect of St. Petersburg.

PROTEST AGAINST OPPRESSION. Paris, Jan. 27.—A meeting in Trovot hall tonight to protest against alleged Russian oppression was attended by 3,000 persons. Anatole France and Madame Savarin were among the speakers.

STRIKE DIRECTED BY SOCIALIST. New York, Jan. 27.—The strike movement in St. Petersburg was carried out under the direction of the Russian Socialist Democratic party.

ARMY VIEWS OF STRIKE. Russian Headquarters, Hun Mountain, Manchuria, Jan. 27.—While the news of the strike disorders and shooting at St. Petersburg and other cities has not produced any serious effect on the rank and file of the army, a feeling of depression and indignation at the agitators should seize a moment when the country is plunged in a foreign war and when the army is about to enter on a decisive campaign to repress the disorder, and above all endeavor the supply of munitions by strikes at the arsenals and outfitting works.

WILL TRY CONCILIATION. St. Petersburg, Jan. 28, 3 a. m.—A special council was held yesterday at Tsarsko-Selo, at which, it is reported, various conciliatory measures were decided on, but no details have yet transpired.

JUDGE SWAYNE'S TRIAL BEGINS FEBRUARY 10

Washington, Dec. 27.—Through his counsel, consisting of former United States Senators Anthony Higgins and John M. Thurston, Judge Swayne today appeared in the senate to make answer to the summons in connection with the impeachment proceedings against him as judge of the United States for the Northern district of Florida. They allowed a week's time to make complete response, and the time for the beginning of the real trial was fixed at Feb. 10.

The galleries were crowded and a large number of members of the house were present in the senate chamber. The discussion of the statehood bill was then resumed, and Messrs. Gallinger, Bailey and Stewart spoke on the gallinger prohibition amendment concerning the sale of liquor in the Indian Territory. At 1 o'clock, when the trial of Judge Swayne was resumed, such interest manifested. There was an exceptional attendance of senators and the vacant spaces in the senate chamber were all occupied by members of the house. The return made by Sergeant-at-Arms Ransell on the summons upon Judge Swayne was read, and after Mr. Ransell was sworn as to the correctness of the return, he called for the appearance of the respondent, saying: "Charles Swayne, Charles Swayne, Charles Swayne, judge of the district court for the Northern district of Florida, appear and answer to the articles of impeachment exhibited by the house of representatives against you."
