London, Jan. 27,-The situation in London, Jan. 27.—The situation in Warsaw is grave, according to the correspondent there of the Daily Mail. When the bakers struck rich people besieged the shops and bought the stock, and the supply of bread is now exhausted. The Socialist party was instrumental in organizing the strike. The correspondent adds that the general condition in Poland is pitiable, owing to the poor harvest. There are fully 300,000 unemployed persons, not reckoning the strikers. Warsaw itself it full of troops, and the gas works and water works are protected by the military.

These same people not long ago said Russia should end the war and beg for peace. Further than this they drive the peace. They err greatly, for even if they hinder and delay the delivery of supplies, the Russian army of half a million in the far east with the means on hand will accomplish the given task. Neither machinations nor uprisings will stayour work. More than at any time victory now is necessary to Russia and victory shall come no matter what it costs."

LAWLESSNESS AS A LABOR WEAPON

Was Used by the Alleged Law and Order Element in the Colorado Strike.

TRUE CAUSE OF THE TROUBLE.

Com'r Wright in His Report Says It Was to Establish the Western Federation of Miners in the Smelters.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 27 .- President Roosevelt sent to the senate today the report of Carroll D. Wright, commissloner of labor, on the strike trouble in Colorado. The report is voluminous, and gives an entire history of labor troubles in that state, together with all the correspondence that has passed between the president with the department of commerce and labor, Gov. Peabody of Colorado; also partial reports made by Commissioner Wright and pamphlets by various parties connect-

ed with the strike. ed with the strike.

Commissioner Wright says there can be no doubt the cause of the strike was to establish the Western Federation of Miners in the smelters, including reduction and refining plants, as it alreedy had been established in the mines

In summing up the situation the commissioner says:
"Lawlessness has accompanied the strike as a labor weapon, and it has ac-companied the actions of the alleged law and order element as a weapon

law and order element as a weapon against the strikers.

"The faults in the organization of the union by allowing strikes to be determined by a committee instead of a referendum, and the faults in the organization of the Citizens' alliance, by allowing irresponsible mobs to represent it, have disturbed the peace of the counties in Colorado in which the conflict has been waged to such an extent that people outside of Colorado wonder if there is any law or any law-abiding if there is any law or any law-abiding citizens in that state.

"It is a fact, that order is restored, for there is a third party now interested, which is claiming the adherence of the best elements in Colorado, and it is the best elements in Colorado, and it is insisting that deportations, whether by the Western Federation of Miners or under the instructions of the Mine Owners' association or Citizens' alliance, shall cease,"

ance, shall cease."

The commissioner says the injunction recently granted by the United States court to prevent interference with the return of the deported miners may bring up the whole question of the right to deport, or whether deportation is a crime under state or federal laws.

And wholesale deportations he says probably will never occur "in the unhappy history of the troubles of that state."

Judge Cowan said that no cattle shipper was discriminated against, but competition rates had disappeared by reason of combination of railroads and the rates had been advanced many points.

should be instituted under the Sherman law. Senator Carmack took the same view and several others said that the district attorney seldom brought actions except in minor cases.

Judge Cowan suggested an amendment to section 15 of the Interstate commerce acts as a means of meeting such discriminations. The amendment makes it the duty of the commission to fix a proper rate and charge in place of any unjust or unreasonable charge, such rate as fixed by the commission to go into effect within 30 days. It imposes a fine upon the carier of \$3 for each day he refuses to accept such rate.
