

# REPUBLICAN LEADERS CONFER

## Chairman Hitchcock Addresses Them, Saying Were Brought Together to Co-operate.

### THEN ALL PRESENT TALKED

Shortcomings in Management Of National Campaigns in Past Years.

Colorado Springs, Colo., July 20.—The first session of Republican leaders with Chairman Frank H. Hitchcock of the national committee opened at 2 p. m. today and continued until nearly 8 o'clock. During that time the members of the national committee and the chairman of state central committees from 16 states and territories addressed the assembly and explained state conditions. Tonight Mr. Hitchcock is talking individually with the leaders of the western states for the purpose of working out with still greater detail the campaign. The greatest enthusiasm was displayed by all the participants in the conference.

Because of the late arrival of some of the western leaders, no effort was made to get together in the forenoon. Instead those men who had already assembled secured automobiles and made a tour of the Garden of the Gods and Manitou Springs. The machine carrying C. C. Bursum, the chairman of the New Mexico committee; W. E. Martin, Republican leader of that territory; and T. L. Weed, one of Mr. Hitchcock's clerks, stalled on a steep hill approaching the balanced rock, and through the failure of the brakes, and the machine started down hill backward. The chauffeur commanded his passengers to jump, and they succeeded in clearing the car just as it reached the brink of a deep gully. The car tumbled and was crushed on the rocks below, with the chauffeur, Thaddeus Thomaseski, underneath. He was not seriously hurt. Two cars were following closely behind the machine. In one Mr. Hitchcock was riding, and in the other was James T. Williams, Jr., of Washington, D. C., who is associated with Mr. Hitchcock. Through prompt action on the part of the drivers of these machines a collision was averted, but both cars and their occupants were in danger of being carried over the brink. The portion of the road where the accident occurred is dangerous for automobiles, and most drivers make wide detours to avoid it.

At 2 o'clock the representatives of all the states and territories invited by Mr. Hitchcock to meet here had arrived with the exception of Nevada, and it was decided to go on with the conference. Mr. Hitchcock addressed his co-workers briefly and explained that he sought them together to broaden their vision and secure co-operation of efforts. After that all the men present talked about conditions in their states. They recited the shortcomings in the management of national campaigns in past years, as it affected their states, and a general discussion was held to devise means of remedying any defects that had been found. The conference adjourned the meeting as a "stock-taking" session.

The representatives from California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington and Wyoming declared in positive terms that their states can be carried for Taft and Sherman, but at the same time insisted that the campaign there should be carried on with the greatest vigor, the enthusiasm extending to Oklahoma, Texas and to the territories.

Speaking for Oklahoma, National Committee Cade and State Chairman Hunter urged that the fight in that state be not ignored. They said that if an earnest effort is made there a close race could be run with the democrats, with some prospect of success, notwithstanding the fact that the democrats have the administration machinery. The positiveness of the representatives of the new state impressed the delegates, and it was agreed that strong work should be done in Oklahoma. Col. Cecil A. Lyon, who is both national committeeman and

# MR. BRYAN AND INJUNCTION PLANK

## Eastern Democrats Notify Him It Is Hardly Worth the Paper It Is Written On.

### CAUSES HIM SOME ANXIETY

May Have Been Tricked—Admits That He Will Cause an Inquiry To Be Started.

Fairview, Lincoln, Neb., July 20.—Influential eastern Democrats today notified William J. Bryan that in their opinion the anti-injunction plank of the platform adopted at Denver was hardly worth the paper it was written on, the reason alleged by them being that the David B. Hill bill, passed by the senate, which is specifically endorsed by the democrats, simply carried out the common law provision, granting a jury trial in contempt cases, "in the jurisdiction of the presiding judge."

The plank was drafted on the assumption that the Hill bill was passed only after it had been amended by Senator Allen of Nebraska to make the trial by jury provision mandatory at the demand of the defendant.

Mr. Bryan spent several anxious hours after he had received this information. While reasonably sure of his ground, the allegation that he and the majority of the committee on resolutions had been "tricked" caused him worry and he admitted that he was to have an inquiry set on foot.

The Associated Press correspondent this afternoon relieved his suspense by explaining to him that advices from Washington showed that the Hill bill, as finally adopted by the United States senate in 1896, provided for the summary punishment by the court in direct contempt cases, but making it mandatory for the court to grant a trial by jury in all cases where such contempt was committed outside of the jurisdiction of the court, and where such jury trial was demanded by the accused. This was the Allen amendment, as Bryan remembered it, and it cleared up what threatened to become an awkward issue for the Democratic candidate.

The part that the prohibition issue will play in the campaign was talked over between Mr. Bryan and Wiley B. Phillips, editor of the California Voice of Los Angeles, who is returning from Columbus, O., where he was a delegate to the National Prohibition convention. "We agreed," said Mr. Phillips, "not to discuss for publication what was said at our conference." Mr. Phillips, however, volunteers the statement that he unquestionably a number of the Prohibitionists would vote for Mr. Bryan against their own candidate. He thought the prohibition movement would affect the vote in the close states and was unwilling to concede to Judge Taft many of these votes.

The appeal of Mr. Bryan to the farmers of the country for campaign contributions is bearing fruit. Today a number of responses were received, the sums enclosed varying in amount. Two old retired farmers from Omaha, one aged 82 years and the other 79, preferred to deliver their contributions in person. They hobbled up the pathway to Fairview and placed in the hands of Mr. Bryan a \$5 bill.

An appeal by Mr. Bryan to the Democratic newspapers of the country to begin the collection of funds for the campaign was one of the important happenings of the day.

Late this evening George Fred Williams of Boston arrived and was driven from the station to Fairview by Mr. Bryan. The two were in lengthy conference upon reaching the Bryan home, where Mr. Williams expected to spend the night.

Mr. Williams on leaving the Bryan home at a late hour said he had discussed with Mr. Bryan many details of the campaign and particularly with reference to the campaign in New England. The subject of a chairman of the national Democratic committee was gone into, but Mr. Williams declared that nothing definite as yet has been determined upon, and would not be until the sub-committee on organizations of the national committee meets in Chicago Saturday next.
