MR. MASSETT AT THE THEATRE.—To-night, Mr. Stephan Massett, known throughout the civilized world as "Col. James Pipes, of Pipeville," will make his first and only appearance at the Theatre, in his renowned entertainment, entitled "Drifting About." PASSED THROUGH CHICAGO.—Amongst our telegraphic dispatches received this morning we came across the following item:

SMITHFIELD.—"Citizen," writing from this thriving settlement, on the 4th inst., says "We are now entering into a co-operative system of farming. A portion of the best land has been selected in our field, consisting of about 800 acres in a body, which can be surrounded with water. The owners of said land, expressed at a mass meeting their willingness to exchange the use of said land for land in other parts of the field, for the coming season. The 300 acres forms two fields, with committees appointed to give out the land in proportion to men's families, and in no wise to refuse a portion to those who apply on the plea of their being non-land-holders, being assured that some who donate the use of their land will not ask other in exchange. By this means we think we can insure our bread another season, and Mr. Hopper surely cannot complain."

"On Friday last, a small bay mare, having a Spanish brand on her left hip, with saddle, bridle, hair and grass ropes on, was found in Bear river by three boys who were hunting along the bank of the river, immediately west of this place. The animal appeared to have been very recently drowned. A grey U. S. blanket was under the saddle. The supposition is that the rider had undertaken to cross the river, not knowing of its quick sand banks, when the animal, getting entangled with the ropes, probably sacrificed his own life, while trying to extricate the animal. Such are the surmises, in the absence of any knowledge in relation to the matter."
