He filled the posi-tion of Bishop with fidelity and honor, until 1890, when he resigned on ac-rount of old age. He was then ordained a Patriarch. He participated in all the vicissitudes incident to the early settle-ment of Sanpete. He took an active ment of Bake Hawk war, serving as ment of Sanpete. He took an active part in the Black Hawk war, serving as part in the Black Hawk war, serving as eaptain; sustained heavy losses by the depredations of the Indians. He helped to organize the Co-op store and was president of same for many years. He has always been an active man in local affairs, helping to build the forts at Ephraim. Mt. Pleasant, Fairview and formion and was the first settler to Sumison, and was the first settler to rut a plow in the ground in the South Mayfield settlement.
