LOCAL BRIEFS.

Typhoid Reported.—Typhoid fever is reported at Fountain Green. The state board of health is investigating.

Death from Typhoid.—J. F. Dibble, a Western Pacific employee, died yesterday of typhoid fever, at St. Mark's hospital.

Council's Action Approved.—Acting Mayor A. J. Davis has approved all of the matters passed by the city council at its Monday night session.

Schools Consolidated.—The Utah Business college and the Stenographic Training school have consolidated, under the direction of E. C. Davis.

Return from Europe.—Treasury A. W. Carlson of Z. C. M. I. and wife have returned from a several month's absence in Europe, visiting with relatives and old friends.

No More Summaries.—The weekly summary of local weather and crop bulletins issued by the weather bureau in this city, has ceased publication until next April, when it will be resumed.

Bible Class.—A Bible class will be started in the First Presbyterian church parlor, next Sunday evening at 7 o'clock, to be held weekly at the same hour. Rev. Dr. Paden will be in charge.
