LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Postmaster Appointed.—Nelson Merkle has been appointed postmaster at Cedar Valley, Utah county.

From the East.—Judge P. H. Emerson, of the First District, returned from his six weeks' visit to the east on Friday evening. He will open court at Provo, to-morrow morning.

Dalton the Murderer.—Dalton, the murderer, has been brought back from Beaver to await his trial, which will take place in due time in the Second District. He is in the Penitentiary.

The Sisters' Conference.—The Sisters' quarterly conference of the Salt Lake Stake will be held in the Salt Lake Assembly Hall, Friday and Saturday, the 24th and 25th inst., meetings to commence at 10 a. m. and 2 p. m. of each day. A general attendance of the ladies is requested, and the brethren are also cordially invited to be present.

Fifteenth Ward Meeting.—The 15th Ward meeting house was jammed full last night, many auditors remaining standing in the vestibule who were unable to procure seats. Elder C. W. Penrose was the first speaker, and was followed by Apostle Joseph F. Smith. The services were very interesting. Bishop Pollock, at the close, announced the intention to rebuild the building forward to an early completion.

The Spanish Fork Outrage.—Saturday's *Provo Enquirer* gives particulars of the trial of Isaac L. Shepley, charged with violating the person of Matilda Holm, age 44, on the 25th ult., while on their way to a party, two or three miles from Spanish Fork. The trial took place before Justice John Moore, last Tuesday. The details are unfit for publication. The testimony of the complainant was very strong against the defendant, but was unsupported by other testimony, and after the alleged outrage she went to the party with the defendant and danced once with him, fearing, as she said, she would lose her way home, if she went alone. She exhibited her dress torn in the struggle with the defendant. The defendant stoutly maintained that what took place was by her consent and in fulfillment of a promise she had previously made, which, however, the complainant vehemently denied. Joseph Tibbitts testified to the defendant's admitting to him that he had seduced the girl. Justice Moore considered that there was not sufficient proof to sustain the accusation and so discharged the defendant. It is a shameful case whatever the real facts may have been.

A Good Man Gone.—The following telegram was received in this city Saturday evening:

PAID, Idaho, Sept. 18, 1880.
 Friend John Taylor, Salt Lake: Bishop Jonathan Pugnieri died Sunday today about 4 o'clock. He ate his dinner and seemed well; he died a few minutes after. C. C. RICH.

The sudden blow will cause sorrow to the hearts of many, for the deceased was widely known and highly respected. He was a member of the Church when a very young man, was in Nauvoo at the time of the martyrdom and performed faithful service in the defense of that city from the mob. He was full of integrity and eminently trustworthy. He was one of the Mormon Battalion, and came to Utah an early day. He was for many years foreman at the Church Blacksmith shop, and also the Bishop of the 7th Ward, previous to his moving north. For several years, and at the time of his death, he was Bishop Edward Hunter's agent at Paris. We withhold further items of his career, awaiting the arrival of particulars of his death from his family and friends in Idaho.

It will be observed that both Bingham and Alta, the two strongholds of the "Liberals," failed to register any last week. This is a bar showing for the "awakening," that is said to have taken place among them. In Alta, the total number of souls registered is 95, and in Bingham 220. It is estimated that in the entire county there are in the neighborhood of 1,000 citizens still remaining unregistered.

Tabernacle Services.—The usual services were held at the Tabernacle yesterday afternoon. The first speaker was Apostle Orson Pratt. He remarked on beginning that it was just 50 years to the day since he was baptized into the Church, and 40 years since he was born into the world. It was to him a double birthday and year of jubilee. A little

over 50 years ago, God saw fit to establish his Church upon the earth and reveal the sacred record called the Book of Mormon, which was delivered by the angel to Joseph Smith 53 years ago, on Wednesday, the 22nd inst. The speaker read and received that book when he was 15 years of age. Previous to coming forth, the whole world had been without divine revelation and authority for hundreds of years. The true gospel had been preached on the eastern hemisphere for 17 centuries and on the western hemisphere for at least 14 centuries, so that this latter was the period in which the world had been enveloped in spiritual darkness. During this time, it was true, the people had a book known as the Bible, giving a history of the gospel in ancient times, but a history of the Gospel was one thing and the power and authority to preach and administer its ordinances was another. No man could be called or authorized to officiate as a servant of God by simply studying the Bible, any more than a candidate for President of the United States could be elected and qualified to officiate by reading the history of how Washington was elected and qualified to act as president. It required a new action, in both cases. And in the former it always came in the shape of a revelation from on high. Some might ask, how did new revelation come? revelation from God for 14 centuries prior to the coming forth of the Book of Mormon. Out of the vast number of people who have used it, the so-called Christian churches, that of which denied the necessity of new revelation, and asserted that there had been none since the close of the 1st century of the Christian era. If this was true, it was enough to convince any one that God had never established such churches. But another might ask, could not there have been a regular succession of authority from the 1st century down to the present time? There certainly could have been such a thing, but everything went to disprove that such had really been the case. The speaker then described when new revelation stopped. In the days of the ancient apostles, no one in the church denied the necessity of new revelation, nor deemed himself qualified to act in the ministry without divine commission, without being called by authority acknowledged of God. And even after being so called, it was impossible for man to act acceptably without personal revelation. It was often that the spirit of God led one in direct opposition to his own inclinations, the latter of which he would follow for man to act acceptably without personal revelation. The beginning of a new revelation was coincident with the setting up of this Church of Latter-day Saints. The speaker then described the first vision of the Prophet Joseph—something far different to what the world had been accustomed to for centuries, and spoke of the times when King James was called the head of the Church and his uninspired translators sat in council, and choosing 60 books as a Bible to guide the human family, therefore and teach them the way of salvation, declared the canon of scripture to be full and no more scripture needed. This, the people were just simple enough to believe, as well as to accept the thirty-nine articles of faith which followed the compilation and which incited that the man must either sustain the decision of the translators or be expelled from the Church. The Latter-day Saints to-day would have been in no better condition than the rest of the world, had not God descended to give new revelation. He closed the heavens on account of man's apostasy. The ancient prophets, apostles and saints had been killed off, and the Lord was about to take the gospel from the earth and await the time when man would be prepared for its restoration. The time came, when the angel raised up this great nation, previous to which his work would not have been permitted to remain. Even here it had had a narrow escape from extermination. After touching upon the doctrine of vicarious baptism and showing the wise and generous provision God had made for all who had died without a knowledge of the Gospel, the speaker changed his theme from the past to the future, depicted the glories of eternal life which the Saints would enjoy through faithfulness to the commandments of God. The speaker of faith and works whose combination was essential in working out salvation, showed that faith, repentance, baptism, and all the ordinances of the Church were gifts from the Almighty through the Atonement of Christ by which they were made possible, legal and effective, and that through these came eternal life. This was the greatest of all the gifts of God. After Elder Pratt had taken his seat, Apostle Willard Woodruff arose and gave him a brief and earnest rebuke. The speaker knew of no man on the earth who had lived longer in the Church, traveled farther and labored more faithfully and diligently in its interests than had Brother Pratt. He was the only one now living of the first Quorum of the Twelve in this dispensation, and had lifted up his voice long and loud as God had commanded him. The speaker hoped and prayed that the Lord would bless and preserve his life for many years to come. The choir, assisted by the organ and orchestra, rendered the beautiful anthem, "The Lord will comfort Zion."
