CHICAGO, 28.—Henry M. Stanley, the African explorer, arrived at Plymouth this evening. In an interview with an Associated Press reporter Stanley said he had completed the work of establishing satisfactory trading stations along the Congo river from its mouth to within 200 miles of the river.

When he left the Congo he was suffering badly from bronchitis, but was much benefited by the sea voyage.
