Salt Lake Route Constructing Its Road Into Prosperous Southern Nevada Camp.

USE THE OLD MILFORD GRADE.

Mountains of Ore, for Years Lying Idle, Will Now be Opened Up.

Now that construction on the Pioche branch of the Salt Lake has really commenced, the little camp is becoming busier, brighter and better with each succeeding day. After years of waiting Pioche is to have rail connection with the outside world. Her mountains of ore have been lying idle for scores of years, idle because the cost of transporting them to a market was prohibitive. Now Pioche looks to Sait Lake as her supply point and shipping point. Salt Lake smelters, mills and ore markets and Salt Lake merchants will share Ploche's coming prosperity; hence Sait Lake has more than a sch-timental reason for being interested in the progress of work on the Ploche branch. There is still another reason; branch. There is still another reason; Sait Lake capital is involved in a large number of Plache and Bristol district properties. Word reached this city sev-cral days ago that construction had been commenced. The branch will be hubit by Deal Bros. & Mendenhall, Utah contractors. As has been explained contractors. As has been explained, rails, ties and other materials have been piled up at Caliente awaiting the com-mencement of work.
