### THAEE CLIMATES.

A 1 a result of in steorological observations the past winter, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, it appears that on the belt of countrys over which the observations extended there are three distinct elimates; or marked divisions of climate first, the section of deep snows, running from Maine to the Mississippi; second, a comparatively snowless region, from the vicinity of the Missistippi river in Minnesota westward it is a good thing and pleasant to go across Dacota and Montana, where less moisture falls in the whole winter than in a single January storm between Lake Michigan and the Atlautic, this snowless region having a winter atmosphere usually devoid of clouds and moisture, baautiful, electric, and invigorating;

third, the region west of the Rocky Mountain chain to the Pacific where there is a great deposition of moisture. The vast region covered by the comparatively snowless climate has a much earlier spring. than in the country east and northeast of it.
