J. P. MORGAN NARROWLY ESCAPED A SHIPWRECK

New York, Aug. 25.—The fact that J. P. Morgan, the financier, was nearly shipwrecked on a ledge in Long Island Sound while returning from Newport to this city yesterday when his steam yacht Corsair, became known today when the yacht was put in a dry dock at Hellgate for repairs. The accident happened near City Island, in the western end of Long Island Sound. The Corsair was making fast time bringing Mr. Morgan and a party of friends to town when she struck a submerged ledge. Reversing her propellers the yacht quickly backed off but began to leak. The machinery was not badly damaged, however, and the Corsair proceeded with her pumps going to keep her free from water.

ALABAMA PROHIBITION LAWS SIGNED BY GOVERNOR

Montgomery, Ala., Aug. 25.—The whole code of prohibition laws passed by the legislature at the session which adjourned last night was signed by the governor today, including the Fuller bill.
