WASHINGTON, 10 .- The Senate committee on finance, to-day, heard Gen. Raum, commissioner of internal revenue, in opposition to the pending House bill on a reduc-tion of the tobacco tax. He asserted that the enactment of the bill would cause an annual loss to the revenue of not less than \$9,000,000 pahoe Indians, \$23,400 for the Bioux, and \$29,400 for the pay of tobacco and of at least \$1,000,000 in revenue from cigars.
