# ANTHRACITE COAL ROADS.

The Czar's Visit to France is So Regarded.

IMPRESSING HIS MAJESTY.

French Hospitality Centers Around Exhibition of Naval and Milltary Strength.

New York, Sept. 19 .- Though the whole of northern France is dressed in holiday attire and good will is visible everywhere, one might be mistaken in regard to the spirit pervading the festivilles, says a dispatch to the Times from Dunkirk. French hospitality to the czar centers round the exhibition of naval and military strength. The object of France is to clear away from the mind of her august guest any doubt of her military and maritime power. The geat display of rapid ardilery fire which is promised for the maneuvers, the special attention given to the new naval factor-the submarine; the attaching of a special deputation of Rus sian staff officers to Gen. Brugerer's personal staff-all confirm this impres-Complegne is humorously compared

to a sleged town. It is crowded with visitors, who can find neither lodging nor food. Many consequently are re-turning to Paris.

The Brussels correspondent of the Times says long articles are being written in all the papers regarding the visit of Emperor Nicholas to France. They are unanimous in the conclusion that the episode is a good augury for the peace of Europe. The anomaly of such a manifestation between nations dif-fering so widely in their forms of government as France and Russia was noted by most of the papers at the time of the czar's last visit to France. This time it is not mentioned.

# Will Not Enter into Negotiations

with Mine Workers. Wilkesbarre, Pa., Sept. 19 .- A report is in circulation here that the presidents of the anthracite coal carrying roads will not enter into any negotiations with the United Mine Workers' organization with a view of holding a joint conference and agreeing upon a new scale of wages to go into effect

next April. It is said the same interest that fought the Amalgamated association will oppose making any concessions to the miners. The Lehigh Valley com-pany, one of the coal carrying roads, has persistently refused to carry on any negotiations with the miners' union and it is claimed it has the sympathy of the other roads.

For three months the employes of the company have been making an effort to settle the grievances of the men em-ployed at the Maltby colliery of the Lehigh Valley company but without success. #### Lots of Salmon From Alaska.

San Francisco, Sept. 19.-Salmon con-tinues to arrive from Alaskan cannertimes to arrive from Anskan canner-ies in large quantities and numerous vessels of the packing fleet are still to come. The receipts for twenty-four hours ended this morning amounted to 101.791 cases and 747 barrels of the food fish. The steamer Kvichak, nineteen days from Nushagak and eleven and a half days from Karluk, brought 26,279 cases and 747 barrels of salmon; the bark Guy C. Goss, twenty-two days from Nushagak, arrived with 39,512 cases of salmon and the ship W. H. Macy twenty-four days from the same place brought 45,000 cases.

#### Eminent English Correspondent Says There is No Doubt of its Sincerity.

London, Sept. 19 .- The Times today prints a dispatch from Washington at-tributed here to Moberly Bell (manager of the Times who is now in the United States), from which the following is an extract:
