The cause was tried last May before Judge Hiles, who found in favor of the respondents. From that judgment ap-

pellant appealed.

For a reversal counsel for appellant relied upon two points. First, that the respondents' notices of location were inifficient, indefinite and uncertain, and that therefore they should not have been admitted in evidence; and second, that the respondents were erroneously permitted to show by expert testimony (Robert Gorlinski) that certain work done by respondents had a tendency to develop both of the mining claims belonging to them, especially when it was not shown that such expert witness had n personal knowledge of the courses of the veins, although he generally knew, and had surveyed the mining ground in

As to the first point the Supreme court finds it wholly untenable, and also holds that the second point was not well

The opinion was delivered by District Judge Rolapp, Chief Justice Bartch and Justice Miner concurring.
