DISCOVERY OF A NORTHWEST
PASSAGE.—A letter in the *Courier*
and *Enquirer* dated Mazatlan,
Nov. 23, states that the British
frigate *Amphytrite*, sloop-of-war
Hecate, and the Royal Thames
Yatch Club schooner *Nancy Daw-*
son, arrived on the 19th inst. from
the Northern Ocean. The writer
affirms that they have discovered
a northwest passage in lat. 73°
and lon. 30° 30', having gone one
degree and a half farther north
than any vessel had previously
been. He also says that they dis-
covered a new continent, but on
account of ice could not approach
nearer than fifteen miles to land.
They did not find Sir John Frank-
lin, and on account of ice were
forced to leave.
