

that the assistant district attorney "extended the compliments of the season to Mr. Weeks." A demand upon a police sergeant for service of a bench warrant for the arrest of Dodge was rejected by that officer, with the excuse that he would "have to see Mr. McAdoo first." Another appeal to the assistant district attorney brought the reply that Dodge had no desire to see the attorney, but he had not retained him and that he was satisfied to be without counsel. Before giving up the struggle early this morning Mr. Weeks said the proceeding was "worthy of Russia." The attorney declared that they believed Dodge was being withheld from Dodge against his will, in hope that a statement might be drawn from him before he was arraigned in court.

At the conclusion of the conference at police headquarters Dist. Atty. Jerome said that Mr. Weeks and Mr. Hummel had been denied admission because Dodge had retained an attorney. He said that Mr. Osborne had been at police headquarters since the arrival of Dodge and had heard everything that had taken place. Mr. Osborne and Dist. Atty. Jerome called at the Broadway Central hotel during the forenoon, and had another lengthy conference with the prisoner.

OFF FOR PANAMA.

Salt Lake Doctor Left for Isthmus Today—Will Also Visit Havana.

Secretary T. B. Beatty of the state board of health, left this afternoon for the Isthmus of Panama in attendance on a meeting of the Pan-American Medical congress. From there he will go to Havana to attend the twenty-second annual meeting at Havana, Cuba, of the American Health association, which covers the United States, Canada, Mexico and Cuba. Dr. Beatty's last meeting will be of special importance, and the topics to be discussed will include, purification and preservation of water supplies, disposal of sewage and industrial wastes, animal diseases common to man, etiology of yellow fever, tuberculosis, plague, demography and statistics in their sanitary relation, infectious period of communicable diseases, public health legislation, causes and prevention of infant mortality, disinfectants and disinfection, teaching of hygiene and granting of diploma of doctor of public health, the sanitation of travel, the tenement house problem, methods to control the milk supply of large cities, hygiene of dress, sanitary agreement between adjoining nations.

Dr. Beatty will be absent for three weeks, and expects to have the time of his life. During his absence, Assistant Secretary H. H. Smith of the board of health will be the acting secretary.

CAUGHT RED HANDED.

Woman Shop Lifter Got Off Easy After Stealing Articles Galore.

A woman shop lifter was caught red handed yesterday afternoon in Z. C. M. I. by Detective Cunningham, taken to the superintendent's office and searched. On her person were found a couple of silver pitchers, and quite a collection of dry goods that she had stolen from Auerbach's and Con's stores. She was detected by Officer Cunningham helping herself to a number of handkerchiefs in Z. C. M. I. and of course these were recovered. The woman was all righted out for such work, carrying a satchel in one hand over her cloak, while inside the cloak was a second satchel which could be opened and closed with a string from without.

The stolen property was taken from the woman, and restored to the rightful owners. No arrest was made as the offender is the wife of a respectable man working for a State street house, and who has a home here. Other large houses report minor troubles with shoplifters.
