Word About Cleaning Paint.

If a regular "scrubber" be em

If a regular "scrubber" be em-ployed, she may leave the painted work looking hight and frish, but it will have been done with scap and sand Sand should never be used upon painted or varnished work. Strong soft scap and sand vigorously applied, will take off a large shate of the paint. To clean paint. first make a moderately a large mate of the paint. To clean paint, first make a moderately strong wap suds, and also have at hand another pail of warm water, with a soft fiannel cleth for each, and also a plate containing "Whit-ing" of "Spanish White"—to be had at all paint or drug stores. One finnel being wet with the sosp rude, dip it in the Whiting to take

up a small quantity, and gently rub the painted work. The surface coating of smoke and other matter will coon be removed, then wip e surface carefully with the othe fannel wrung out from the warm witer, and the painted work will ook "as good as new."
