## MRS. GRIFFIN AWARDED \$8,000.

As Damages for the Death of Her  
Husband in Suit Against  
S. P. Railroad.

## FLAG DAY AT STATE SCHOOL.

Weddings—Brakeman George Burke  
Looses Both Feet—Death of Miss  
Rogers—Stabbing Affray.

Ogden, Utah, June 15.—Mrs. Pauline Griffin, administratrix of the estate of Herbert Griffin, was awarded a verdict of \$8,000 yesterday afternoon by a jury in her suit against the Southern Pacific for the death of her husband.

The case has been on trial since last Friday in the second district court before Judge Howell. The taking of the testimony of the prosecution was completed Tuesday evening when the defense moved for a dismissal of the action on the ground that the deceased, Herbert Griffin, met his injury in Nevada and died in Boxelder county and therefore the court had no jurisdiction to hear the case.

The court overruled this motion yesterday morning, holding that the defense had not brought the motion at the proper time.

Mrs. Griffin brought the suit through her attorney, A. W. Agee, to recover \$25,000 damages. The evidence showed that Mr. Griffin was employed at the Ogden roundhouse on one of the freight trains. That on Dec. 1, 1903, the engine on which he was riding collided with an eastbound freight train, injuring the young man, and that the accident was caused by the carelessness of the railroad company having no light on its engine, and that the air brakes being out of order. The young man is survived by a wife and one child. The jury was not unanimous in their verdict for the plaintiff. Alex Baries caused the dissenting vote.

### LOSING BOTH FEET.


George Burke, the unfortunate brakeman who was injured a short time ago in the union depot yard in this city, having both of his feet badly injured, necessitating the amputation of one of his feet just below the knee, has had to undergo another operation for the amputation of his other foot, which was performed yesterday afternoon by Dr. Perkins and Joyce. Every effort has been made by the physicians to save the one foot, but the injury was so severe that it was necessary to grow together, and the second operation had to be performed in order to save his life. The young man who is now in the hospital, is getting along as well as can be expected, although he is still very weak, but the doctors think he will recover.

### J. MORAN WANTED FOR BATTERY

A warrant for the arrest of J. Moran, one of the foremen in the railroad shop, was issued yesterday, and placed in the hands of the police for his arrest on the charge of assault and battery, preferred against him by W. H. White, one of the employees of the shop, White claims that Tuesday, while he was at the shop at work Moran came up to him and struck him a heavy blow on the head with a blunt instrument, knocking him to the floor unconscious, in which condition Moran left him until he was found by some fellow workmen, and carried to the office and revived, and was then sent to his home on River avenue. Detective Pender and Capt. Brown were sent for and after hearing White's story took Municipal Court Clerk Jensen to the home of Moran, charging him with the offense. There he was held for a long time.

### CLAUDE G. BILLINGS BURIED.

Funeral of Unfortunate Young Man Held in L. D. S. Chapel.

Eureka, Utah Co., June 14.—The remains of Claude G. Billings, the young man who took his life at Butte, Mont., last Saturday afternoon by shooting himself in the head, arrived here this morning, and funeral services were held at the L. D. S. church this afternoon, being conducted by the ward high priest. At the conclusion of the services, the remains were escorted to the cemetery by the L. D. S. church.
