London, Sept. 26.—At the moment, in the rush of the season of shooting and country house entertainments, society has had time to discuss the latest and most interesting American colony, it consists Lord Granard and Miss Ogden Mills.

Kansas City Stock Yards, Sept. 30.—Although there was a reduction of 20,000 head in cattle receipts here last week, as compared with the previous week, offerings from Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, Wyoming and the Pacific states were high in number. The total were 44,000 head, including 14,000 calves, and the market advanced 15 to 20 cents. The run today moderate, at \$1.00 head, and the market steady to strong. Some extra good New Mexico cows are here today at \$3.25 to \$3.60, medium cows from same locality, receiving \$3.00 to \$3.25, steers \$3.00 to \$4.00. Colored steers sold to day at \$3.25, medium quality, some pretty good cows lately at \$3.15 to \$3.60. Fall Utah killers at \$4.00 to \$4.45, feeders \$2.65 to \$3.95, stockers \$2.25 to \$2.40. Panhandle cows brought \$2.90 today that sold at \$2.45 a week ago, bulk of cows \$2.75 to \$2.90, stockers \$3.50 to \$4.00, calves \$4.00 to \$4.25. Fall buyers are 100 car loads of stockers and feeders last week, and 1,300 car loads the week previous. Shipments to the country for September will be greatest ever known here in one month. With killer buyers holding large orders, together with the active competition from country buyers, prospects are good for a steady to strong market through October.

The supply was liberal last week, 61,000 head, marked slightly lower on all kinds. An extra heavy demand from the country is the sustaining feature, nearly 50 per cent of this supply being taken for feeding or breeding purposes. Supply is 6,000 today, market steady, selling lambs at \$6.75 to \$7.15, wefters and yearlings at \$5.00 to \$5.50, fall lambs bring \$6.40 to \$6.75, wefters and yearlings \$5.25 to \$5.50, wefters \$5.25 to \$5.60. There is an extraordinary demand for breeding ewes here, and the same condition exists all over the range country as well.

CULTURED AND SIXTY.

She is presenting herself with a sumptuous trimming which is now being made in Paris. Already she has some wonderful presents from her fiance which include diamonds and furs.
