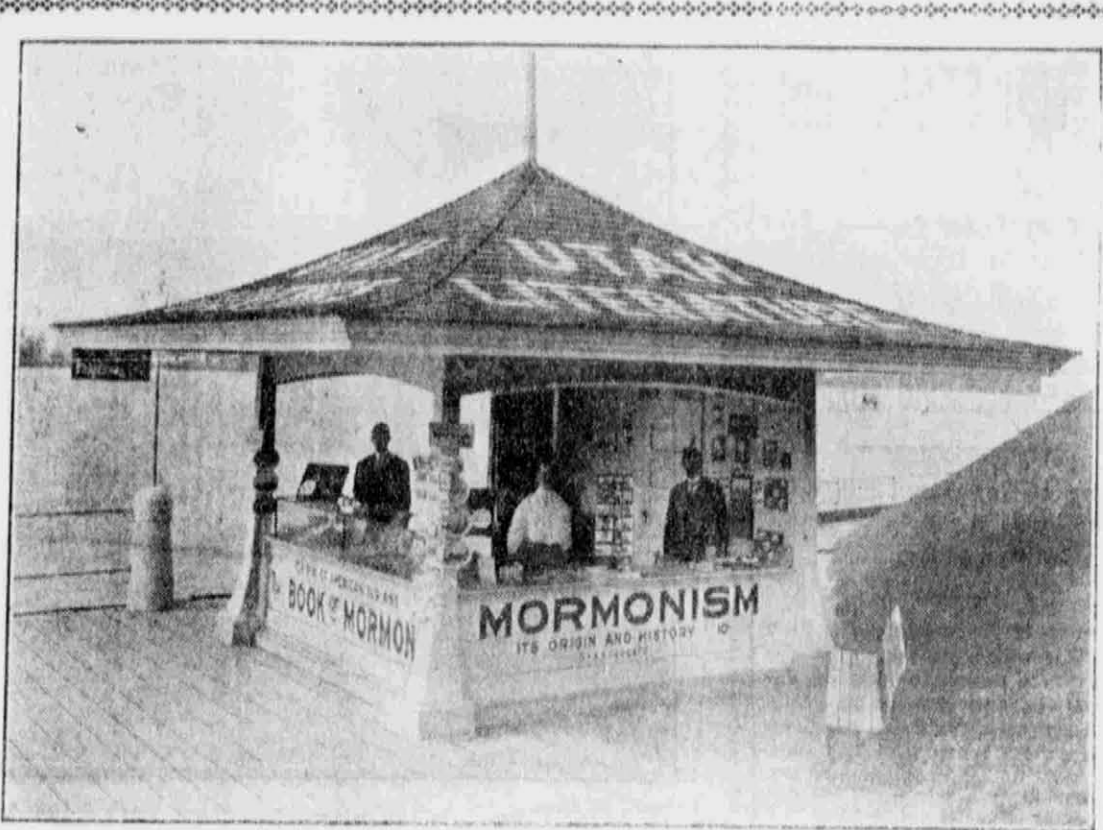

MORMON INFORMATION BUREAU.

Church Literature Booth at the Lewis-Clark Exposition at Portland.

Considerable attention has been directed to a neat little booth pleasantly situated on the esplanade in the exposition grounds at Portland.

Months ago a few gentlemen conceived the idea that such an enterprise might prove profitable and enable visitors to obtain not only "Mormon" Church literature but views and curios pertaining to Utah and its people. At the St. Louis fair there was a big demand for the Book of Mormon, and this suggested the advisability of establishing a stand, if possible, in the vicinity of the Utah building, where visitors could secure Church publications, thus furnishing an opportunity also for explaining Mormonism and counteracting the vicious efforts constantly made to misrepresent the Church and its members.

An excellent site was secured, as indicated in the illustration, and intelligent young people were engaged to take charge. A large number of pamphlets have been distributed and considerable opportunities are afforded for explain-

ing to interested enquirers the faith and history of the Latter-day Saints. Elders J. Peter Goddard and Andrew Jackson and Mrs. Gertrude Musser-Howard have been in daily attendance since the opening of the exposition, and the promoters are well satisfied with the results thus far.

Concerning the bureau and its work the Portland Telegram of September 9 gives the following account:
"To correct the prevailing impressions in regard to the Mormon religion, and to set before the public in a true light the religion of the Mormon Church is the object of the Mormon information bureau, established at the Lewis and Clark exposition."
"Although in no way connected with the Utah commission or state building, it is situated near that structure, on the shore of Clatsop lake, and is in the path of many people who pass it every day."

In the booth are kept copies of the Book of Mormon, and all kinds of literature on the Church, its religion and its purposes. Since the exposition first opened, it is estimated that tons and tons of this literature have been distributed.

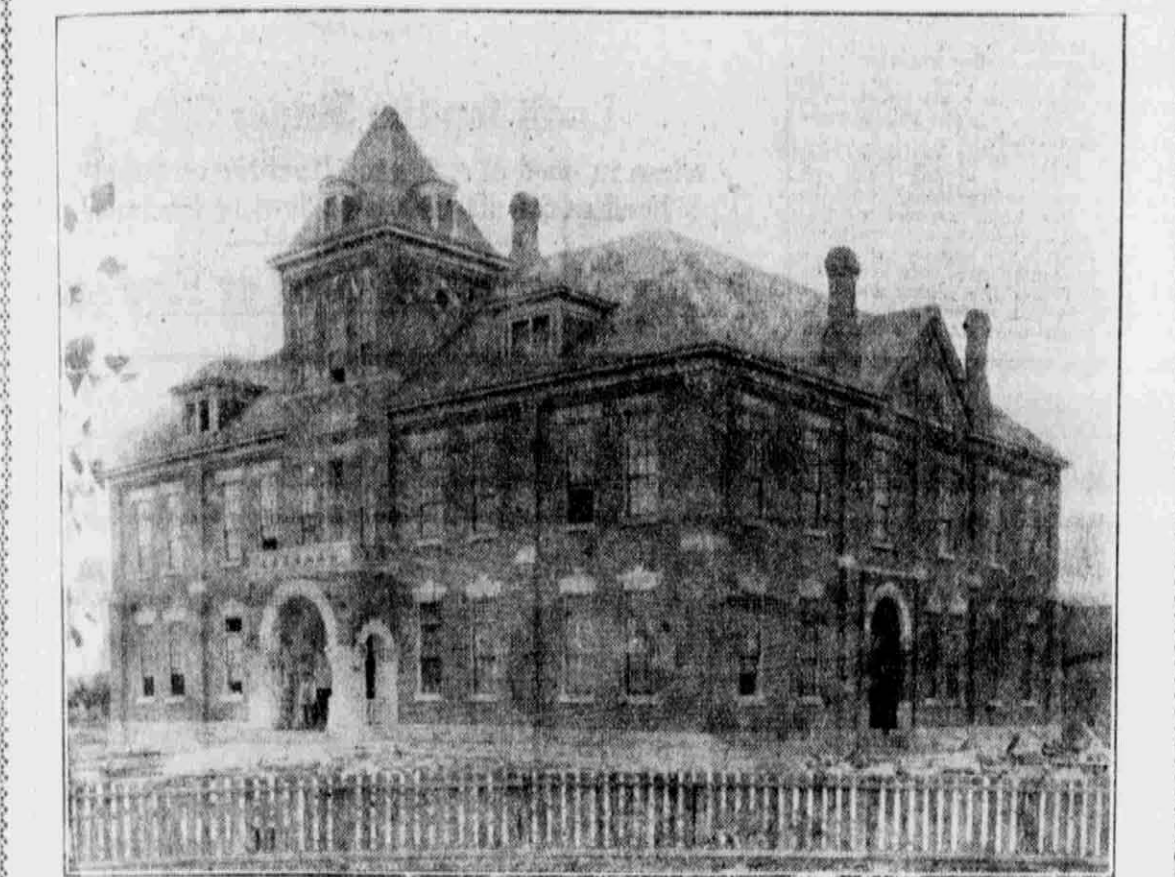
The idea being to give the fair visitors an idea of the Mormon faith from the standpoint of the Mormons themselves. "At the booth visitors are told that polygamy has been prohibited in Utah and by the Church since 1892, and that it is in nowise tolerated. The attendants explain that the Bible is used in the Church in connection with the Book of Mormon. The Bible relates events which happened in the eastern hemisphere, while the Book of Mormon is a record of the western hemisphere and Christ's work here."

"When the irrigation congress was in session at the exposition a few weeks ago, the greater part of the delegates visited the booth in a body one afternoon and cleared it out of all literature, so it was almost necessary to suspend operations."

"Pamphlets are also distributed, telling of the great work of the Mormon people in making the State of Utah one of the most fertile in the country through irrigation."

He is enthusiastic over the prospects of the Normal school for this year and expects the registration lists of the 1905 senior class to show an increase of at least 25 over the 115 of the 1904 class.

of the normal graduating class of last year, as far as can be ascertained, every one has a good position, and Prof. Stewart states that he could have placed 50 more had he had them.

That the good reputation of the Utah Normal school is known outside of its State, is shown by a letter to Prof. Stewart, from California, asking for the names and addresses of 30 high school graduates who are wanted in California public schools.

The training school opened with additional room and equipment and a full corps of teachers on Monday last under the most favorable conditions.

The university has given the Chronicle staff a fine rug, some new furniture, and made a most pleasant office out of the old room.

The old Freshman drawing room in the physical building has been divided into two rooms which are to be devoted to the manual training classes. The electrical apparatus will be moved to the wing to make room for the domestic science laboratory.

building is to be devoted exclusively to the department of biology, which includes the new medical department.

Work was commenced Thursday on the athletic field getting it in shape for the football season.

SALT LAKE CITY SCHOOLS.

A steady increase in school attendance has been marked during the week. Friday night registers nearly 12,000 students. The re-districting has assisted in solving the problem of how to care for the vast army of boys and girls in the city. Unprecedented figures have been reached in some districts.

The Lowell alone enrolled 167 beginners, while the Fremont has in all its grades 470; the Lafayette 125, and the Washington 655.

The physical conditions of all buildings has been greatly improved since a thorough renovating has been effected during the vacation.

The Union and Wasatch have new floors laid in the corridors, while the Lowell has received the addition of a paved walk to the main entrance.

The Lafayette presents a more inviting appearance now than it did even at the time of its widely heralded opening just one year ago.

The high school problem seems to have reached a happy solution. The week closed with a registration just 4 points below the 1,500 notch. Principal Eaton has been successful in securing the lower floor of the Union for high school purposes. The present outlook is that all buildings on the High school block will eventually be used for high school work. The new arrangement has necessitated a change in the location of departments. English division is housed on the first floor of the main building; the modern languages on the second; ancient languages on the third; the science building accommodates the science and mathematics department, while the history division is quartered in the Union.

The high school athletes are trying for places on the foot ball team for the coming season. Ben Harrison, of the class of '04, and now a student at Michigan university, will supervise the work until his departure for the east.

Leo Fairbanks, recently returned from Paris, has assumed charge of the drawing work in the schools.

WEBER STAKE ACADEMY.

Ogden—Under the most favorable circumstances and surely with the most encouraging prospects in its entire history, the academy commenced this year's work last Monday with an increased registration of 20 per cent.

There were present at the formal opening of the academy last Tuesday morning Presidents Lewis W. Shurtliff and Charles P. Middleton and Blahon McQuarrie, members of the board all of whom made interesting and instructive remarks in an optimistic vein.

The increased attendance at the out-post has made it necessary to organize parallel sections in the life of Christ, Book of Mormon and Algebra I. This is a painful condition and indicates that the work will be even more thorough than heretofore.

A complete set of Chambers Encyclopedia, 10 volumes, was presented to the school last Wednesday by Bishop Benjamen of Huntsville.

The faculty and students appreciate the substantial and thorough cleaning the building has received, together with the rubber dressing of the stairways. This latter improvement not only preserves the steps, but reduces the noise to a minimum.

Prof. Thomas E. McKay is very much missed from the teaching force this year. He leaves today for the Agricultural college where he goes to teach German and mathematics and also to pursue courses in agriculture. We wish him as much success in his new venture as he achieved while a member of our faculty.

The increased facilities for normal training give satisfaction to the normal students and kindergartners.

Four teachers are taking care of the work in English this year. Jackson, Whitson, J. H. Evans, Marion Adams and Ada Blinn.

Five teachers are teaching languages: A. R. Christensen, German; Mlle. Domergue, French; J. E. Nowlin, Latin and Greek; J. M. Mills and Marcena Foster, Spanish.

On account of the increased pressure in the typewriting department, eight additional machines have been put in, to accommodate the students.

Two new teachers have been employed for this year's work at the Latter-day Saints' university. Lee Greene Richards has been engaged to take the classes in the instruction of art, and Mlle. Domergue has been engaged for the classes in French. Both these teachers are well known for their special ability in the lines they represent.

Mr. Richards who has been for a number of years in Paris, is an artist of ability, and his presence will be a well thought of in art circles. Mlle. Domergue is a teacher of French language and literature of great ability and wide experience, a native of France, and trained in the schools of that country. She has been for several years in this city teaching classes in French. Her success has been marked and she is highly recommended by a numerous circle of pupils. The trustees consider themselves fortunate in these two acquisitions to the list of the faculty.

Barratt hall has been handsomely decorated on the interior in three colors with paint and calkmed. The walls and ceiling are in two colors, and the beams and wood-work are grained in oak. The color of the walls is light brown and cream. The effect is restful and delicate, and good for the eyes. The hall has now an artistic interior.

The business college has been renovated throughout. The interior walls are picturesque in three colors. The main entrance is red with light brown above, the halls are yellow, the rooms pale green and pale brown. The gold and blue office is finished in yellow and blue.
