Shot in the Face While Out on a Hunt for Quail.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH.

Nevada Making Heavy Shipments to California—Dispute Over Money Matters Results in a Stealing Affray.

Several houses were shipped last week from San Francisco to Pecos, N.M., where the automobile will be used in the chase. It is said that a large number of retired street car horses meet the same fate every year.

Baltimore has fifty W. C. T. U. units including business women. The United Temperance League of the city have a membership of 1,200. The headquarters building is at 1200 N. Broadway. The organization is active in the state and city. Units have been organized.

Wm. E. Deamond and J. W. Haney had a dispute about money matters at San Francisco, and during the excitement Deamond stabbed Haney with a pocket knife. He was charged at the downtown-street police station with assault on Deamond. Haney was removed to his home. His wounds are not serious.

Secretary Thomas, of the Idaho Irrigation and Cattle Raisers' Association, who presides at the vicinity of Caldwell, yesterday said in the neighborhood of 300 shares of stock of the company that had been to offer as security to pay the recently levied assessment of \$2 per share. There were in all 1,200 shares advertised to be sold, but the balance of about half of that number came to the front with their payments and the remainder was sold by auction.

Joseph Millard, a prominent resident of Ashland, Or., is at the Occidental hotel, San Francisco, with a piece of his leg shot in each eye, and an amputation of the right leg. The accident was caused by Mr. Millard's attempting to get in the way of a stage of horses and while backing a team of horses. He was not hurt by the horses, but by the falling of a heavy beam from the ceiling of the stable. He was brought to San Francisco by local officials.

Well posted authorities express the opinion that during the season now fast drawing to a close, the shipments of cattle from the state of Nevada have been all previous records. These heavy movements, taken with the movement in prize, have been the cause of making some wonderful increases in the volume of money in the neighboring states on the west. There are still a few more shipments of live stock to be made from out along the line of the Southern Pacific and then the season is through. Some fifteen carloads of fat stock were loaded at Wells yesterday and started for Omaha and Kansas City markets. The shipment was made by Mr. Powers, who had previously moved 100 carloads of stock into Wyoming and on to the markets of the East.

John Walsh, a builder, had a narrow escape from injury at San Francisco yesterday evening. He was driving a spirited horse on Golden Gate avenue and alighted to speak to a friend. When he attempted to remount his car the horse started to run away, dragging the unfortunate builder for nearly a half block. At Jones street the car collided with a buggy in which were seated two young women, precipitating them into the street and causing their horse to run away. Walsh was picked up in a semi-conscious condition and removed to the receiving hospital. His left arm was found to be broken near the elbow and his body bruised in several places. The young ladies, fortunately, escaped unhurt.

Points For Young Writers.

I have said that the manuscript of a young author will usually be sufficient evidence of the possibilities of the writer. It is hardly worth while to emphasize the fact of juvenility by sending your contribution to a person later making that it is your first attempt at authorship. If your offering is good, the editor will not care if it is your first, but he will sincerely hope it may not be your last.

But in this case you run right against another danger. If it is accepted, you come to the realization that the editor has been very much at a loss for suitable matter with which to fill his columns, and you resolve to help him out. So you proceed to deliver him with your manuscript after another, sending them on faster than he can read them. Your kindness overcomes him and he proceeds to send them all back promising that to offer you further immediate encouragement would be further trouble for himself. For however good your work may be, few editors will care to have your name to appear more often than once or twice in the index of a single volume.

We read at the head of the "Javahis" contributor: "D. you happen to know who he is? He is the one who sends, at such frequent intervals, a good contribution. He is the accepted writer who has learned that to increase his value by holding himself and his work a little in reserve."—James K. Knappe, in the New Humanist.
