IS THE EDDY SUIT

Defendants File Their Answer And Say Mrs. Eddy's Mental Faculties Not Impaired.

HAVEN'T DIVERTED MONEY.

They Charge That the So-Called "Next Friends" Are Such in Name Only-

Concord, N. H., April 17 .- A general denial of all the allegations of the complaints in the suits for an accounting of the property of Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy, filed March 1, was the legal answer made today by the defendants named in the original action.

The specifications in the original bill are that Mrs. Eddy is and for a long time has been incompetent to do bustness or to understand transactions conducted in her name; that the defend-ants whose answer was filed today, ants whose answer was filed today, with other leaders of the Christian Science church who were named in the original bill, have possessed themselves of the property of Mrs. Eddy and have carried on her business; that on account of Mrs. Eddy's infirmity these persons are bound to give account of all transactions undertaken in her name, and that the defendants have wrongfully converted to their own tise property belonging to the church.

To these representations the defendants filed specific and detailed denial. They declare that the suit was not brought in good faith.

The defendants, Alfred Farlow, Ira O. Knapp. Wm. L. Johnson, Stephen A. Chase, Joseph Armstrong and Edward A. Kimball, in their answer to the bill of complaint deny that Mrs. Eddy's mental faculties are so impaired by the infirmities of age or otherwise as to reader her incapable of man-

by the infirmities of age or otherwise as to render her incapable of managing her affairs and protecting her property against undue influence, control or fraud of others, or that she is incapable of taking charge and managing the present or any other legal proceedings. They also deny she is in charge and custody of the defendants, Frye and Strang, or of any one else. The defendants say that the allegations in the bill of complaint are in large part immaterial, scandalous and irrelevant, and that they ought not to be called on to make answer thereto, and pray the judgment of the court thereupon; and Defendant Armstrong denies that he is the publisher of all the Christian Science works, as alleged, but says that he is a publisher of Mrs. Eddy's personal writings, and that he had periodically and fully accounted for and turned over to her all royalties and profits from such publications; and for and turned over to her all royalties and profits from such publications; and the other defendants, admitting their respective connection with the Christian Science organization, deny that they have received any moneys or income belonging to Mrs. Eddy, or that such income is controlled or retained in any way by them.

The defendants say they have no knowledge or information respecting

The defendants say they have no knowledge or information respecting the nature and extent of the property of Mrs. Eddy, and deny that they have ever wrongfully converted to their own private use or otherwise misappropriated or unlawfully diverted any money or property of Mrs. Eddy.

The defendants further say that they believe that the bill of complaint is not properly in good faith for the purpose

believe that the bill of compant is not brought in good faith for the purpose of protecting her person and property. They charge that the so-called "next friends" are such only in name, and that they have been induced to loan their names for use in the suit at the interior of carrain evil-minded pertheir names for use in the suit at the instigation of certain evil-minded persons not related in any way to Mrs. Eddy or having any interest in her or her estate, and who are furnishing money for the prosecution of the suit for their own evil purposes and to advance their own selfish interests. These persons, defendants allege, are hostile to Mrs. Eddy and to the religious principles of which she is the founder.

The defendants demand proof of all the material matters complained of which are not admitted specifically, and they say they ought not to make this or any answer to the bill because it is multifarious, vague and indefinite and filled with immaterial, scandalous and irrelevant matter and does not set forth any cause of action under the state laws of New Hampshire.

Besides the Boston defendants, C. A. Frye, Irving C. Tomlinson, H. S. Herring and Lewis C. Strang of Concord, the New Hampshire residents, among the Gefendants named in the original bill in equity, also filed their answer today. Mr. Frye says he has been in the employ of Mrs. Eddy for about 25 years, for a considerable part of the time as private secretary. During all the time her house at Concord and all other houses in which she has resided, together with all persons employed or connected therewith, have always been under the absolute control and direction of Mrs. Eddy. Mrs. Eddy determines for herself whom she will see and the length of time that will be given for that purpose, according to Mr. Frye's answer, and the defendant denies that he ever, personally or in conjunction with others, refused to allow any one to see Mrs. Eddy, or that he limited the time to be allowed to persons desiring to coufer with her, except in accordance with the rules pre-

he limited the time to be allowed to persons desiring to confer with her, except in accordance with the rules prescribed by Mrs. Eddy for the conduct of her household and business.

The answer of Strang is practically the same as that of Frye, while the answers of Tomlinson and Herring vary only insofar as their relations with Mrs. Eddy differ from those of Frye and Strang.

In addition to this order the commis-In addition to this order the commission has addressed a letter to the Lincoln Traction company, the Citizens Railway company of Lincoln, the Omaha, Lincoln & Beatrice Interurban and Omaha & Council Bluffs Street Railway corporation, notifying them that they are subject to the terms of the new anti-pass law and will be expected to obey it, both by issuing no passes, aside from the exceptions permitted by statute and by filing reports each month as to who the pass holders are,

POPE PIUS SUSPENDS FATHER ROMOLO MURRI.

Rome, April 17.—Father Romolo Murri, leader of the Catholio Democrats here, has been suspended ad divinis by the pope for disobeying papal instructions regarding the behavior of the clergy. The punishment inflicted on Father Murri has aroused more or less excitement, principally among the liberal Catholics. Father Murri's offense consisted of severe criticism of the action of the church in Italy, as well as comment on the French situation, especially the Montagnini documents.

The suspension means that Father Murri may not exercise his clerical office or administer and enjoy the fruits of his ministry.

Rome, a weekly Catholic paper, recalls that in 1962 the pope, who was then patriarch of Venice, had occasion to reprimand Father Murri for certain writings. Father Murri thereupon wrote a strongly worded letter to the patriarch, saying he expressed an opinion about writings which perhaps he had not read. He added that he could not permit such criticism, and asked for an apology.

At the recent consistory the pope delivered a speech in which he condemned with energy certain new ideas which, he said, threatened to bring about rebellion under the pretext of a return to the pure gospel. The allusion to the principles of Father Murri was evident.

Steunenberg of Idaho before they have been tried and for denying them the rights of American citizens to be presumed innecent until proved guilty. The irate labor leaders requested that the president retract and asked for a square deal for the men whose names he has clouded.

New Haven, Conn., April 17.—Leroy Taylor or "Bob" Taylor, who says he is 24 years of age, a cowboy and comes from Broadbent, Ont., was arrested here yesterday and held in \$1,000 bends for breach of the peace. The arrest followed from complaints from Montowez and North Haven that several persons had been held up by a man riding wildly through the district clad in a grey suit and sombrero, armed with two big revolvers and mounted on a fast horse.

DUTY ON LEEDS NECKLACE. New York, April 18.—More than \$123,000 has been paid over to the United States treasury as a result of the litigation in volving the importation of the so-called "Tiffany pearls" and also the "Leeds necklace."

A dispute over the question of classification of these two expensive jewels caused this litigation.

The appeal having gone against the importers the court having decided that the duty must be paid before any further uppeal would be considered. Bernard Citteen, the importer of the Leeds necklace, paid Collector Stranahan yesterday \$116,325, the balance due upon the pearls in question. Upon such payment the papers were forwarded to the board of general appraisers for determination of the question of whether the pearls were subject to duty at the rate of 16 per cent or 80 per cent. There was received also by Collector Stranahan the sum of \$2,532 from Tiffany & Co.

SHOOTING STARVING CATTLE.

Los Angeles, April 17.—Deputies of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals today killed many head of starving cattle, included in a shipment which arrived at the Southern Facific yards from the ranges of western Texas. It is stated that there are many thousand head of cattle in danger of starvation in that section and that feed cannot be obtained, in hope of saving part of their herds, owners have begun shipping to southern California, Today shipments numbered L. 200 head and many of them arrived in such condition that they were immediately shot. Others were reshipped to the ranges in Santa Barbara and Ventura counties.

COULDN'T WAKE CAPT. MACKLIN, San Antonio, Tex. April 17.—Corp. Madison, a discharged negro of the Twenty-afth infantry, testified today in the Mack-lin court-martial, that he tried to awaken Capt. Mackin on the night of the Brownsville affray. He pounded on the door with a rife butt, and called loudly but got no reply. Four other negro witnesses told practically the same story.

DONNA GILMAN MURDER CASE. Dayton, O., April 17.—Affidavits were filed in court today charging the mother, brother and two sisters of Donna Gilman, whose body was found on a commons near her home last November, with the murder of the girl, The grand jury ignored the case against the Gilmans.

N. Y. CRIMINAL LAW.

As Result of Thaw Trial Bill is Introduced to Amend It.

Albany, N. Y., April 17.—One of the asp\$its of the case of Harry K. Thaw appears to be responsible for the introduction in the senate today by Senator Agnew of New York of a bill designed to amend the criminal code in relation to inquiry before trial into the sanity of a defendant indicted for a felony. In such a case either the defendant's attorneys or the district attorney may aptorneys or the district attorney may aptorneys or the district attorney may apply to any justice of the court in which the indictment is pending for an order committing the defendant to a state hospital for the insane for observation. The motion shall be based upon affidativits executed by two duly qualified examiners in lunacy, to the effect that the defendant is insane.

CAR CLEANER MURDERED BECAUSE REFUSED TO STRIKE

Chicago, April 18.—Because he refused to go on strike, Edward F. Fago, a car cleaner employed by the Chicago & Northwestern railroad, was hit on the head with a brick last night and then jumped on and kicked by three men. He died a short time

The police arrested Paul Majka and are searching for Henry Wotka and Joseph Maika, who, they assert, aided in the attack on Fago.

The strike which led to the murder occurred three weeks ago. At that time the men became dissatisfied with the wages paid them and quit. Fago, who had been employed by the company for five years, refused to join them. Other men were hired to fill the places made vacant by the strikers, and the latter were refused employment.




