Campbell, the manager of the company, who stated that the rights which the city desired to ac-quire were very valuable and could be sold for a large amount, but that the company did not wish to part with them, unless they were required by the then, unless they were required by the city. I told him that, while the city would probably require the rights, it was not then in a position to pay out any large sum of money for them. He any large sum of money for them. He replied that the company owned sev-eral frankcises, some of which had been acquired from other parties; that they expired at different times, and that it would be a great advantage to the company to have them consolidat-ed. He stated that the company de-sired to issue more honds, and if it had one franchise covering all its rights it would be easier to raise the money on one franchise covering all its rights it would be easier to raise the money on the new bonds than it would be on different franchises, whose terms were not uniform and which expired at dif-ferent times. Later he told me that if such a franchise could be obtained from the city, the company would be willing to convey the desired rights in exchange therefor.
