Doctor Burns placed two Hindoos face to face, and after placing the index fingers on each other's tongues, they were made to step backwards forty-five feet, wind up the silk, and repeat the operation until the saliya yielded no more silk.

On the first day, the Parlus produced but 150 lbs. silk; on the second, 250 lbs., and afterwards from 350 to 400 lbs. per diem. This was not a bad investment when it is remembered that the human silk is not liable to the accidents which attack that produced by worms. Dr. Burns made use of the usual windtug apparatus without any difficulty. The silk produced by means of sericum has the glittering appearance of the gloss fubrics exhibited frequently in the museums of France, and said to be of the greatest value for the manufacture of heavy articles.
