This is all true; but Br. T. seems forget that these very worms originate in the shade of the very tree which they have thus stripped, and, as a man ter of course, they are now exposed to the sun, not of choice, but of necessity having eaten off all the foliage, the perchance may be found "ensconced of the tops of the tallest branches," no to sun themselves, but in search of more food, shielding themselves as bes

they can, by their own webs.
