Washington, 5.—The Governor of California has notified the Secretary of the Treasury that he has designated Dr. W. W. McKim as Consul General of Emigration at the port of San Francisco.

Dickerson, of New Jersey, has been appointed Chief of Division in the office of the Comptroller of Currency, vice E. M. Miller.

The Treasury Department is receiving an increased demand for small currency, which is regarded by the officials of that department as a serious curtailment in the business of the country.

The Commissioner of Customs has instructed all the customs officers to make a return at the close of each quarter of all the unclaimed merchandise in the public stores, bonded warehouses, or other places, on or before the 15th of the month.

It is ascertained that the engrossed bill authorizing the Attorney General to begin proceedings for the amendment of patents issued through fraud or misrepresentation, together with all papers connected therewith, has passed the Senate.

The new National Theatre was formally dedicated last evening. It has been erected by Mr. W. W. Ripley on the site of the old theatre, which was destroyed by fire, the first one in 1846, and the second in 1874.

Commissioner Atkins, of the Indian Bureau, left this city today on a tour of inspection through the various Indian reservations. As the Holman investigating committee is about to visit southwestern agencies, the Commissioner joined the committee, which left this afternoon for the Indian Territory.

CHARLESTON, 5.—Dr. W. C. Crenshaw, a brother of Mr. Crenshaw, who was murdered by masked men at Edgefield, has sworn out warrants for the arrest of 24 persons implicated in the so-called lynching, including Memphis Crenshaw, a son of the murdered man.

GALETON, 5.—A dispatch from Rusk, Texas, to the News says: Yesterday at the terminus of the Kansas Gulf Shore line, near Lufkin, Texas, 10 convicts working on the road made a desperate break for liberty just as they had finished their supper. With a shouting yell they started for the body and rushed to the neighboring woods.

CHICAGO, 5.—A special to the Standard from Chicago says: A man who was serving life sentences and was known to be a desperate character, had been extra prominently taken. Every means possible is being used to recapture the thirty-five men who are being held in the city.

NEW ORLEANS, 5.—A special to the Standard from New Orleans, Miss., says: The convicts of the Louisiana State Penitentiary and members of the Legislature were held here today after it had been ascertained that an outbreak occurred between I. W. Mullins, formerly a member of the Legislature and W. Watson, an attorney, both of Byalala. Pistols were used at the scene and Watson was shot in the right side and died in a few minutes. WASHINGTON, 5.—The phenomena of tornadoes in relation to scientific study, to which Lieut. John P. Finley of the Signal Corps has devoted about eight years, are now so well understood as to warrant the belief that trustworthy warnings may be sent out to the inhabitants of localities which may be threatened with a disastrous visitation. Daily predictions are in fact being made at present, having been begun last year and continued during the tornado season and resumed recently upon the return of Lieut. Finley from an inspection tour in the West.

TO A REPORTER of the Associated Press, Lieut. Finley described the known phenomena of tornadoes and the ends toward which his present researches are directed. He said that storms have distinctly marked characteristics, and are by no means to be confounded with hurricanes, typhoons, cyclones or northeasters.

Their tracks are never more than a few hundred miles wide, and the forces are generally exhausted by the time they have traveled a course of 40 or 50 miles. In the past, however, they have been traced by their lines of devastation more than 150 miles. Their rotary motion, which is always toward the center, sometimes reaches the enormous rate of 100 miles an hour, and ordinarily does not exceed 50 or 60 miles. They are usually accompanied by electrical disturbances and are believed to be unannounced by electrical conditions, though violent thunderstorms follow them a few miles away.

There is a distinct and curious relationship between a tornado and a general storm center, which is always apparent in their uniform relative positions, the tornado always occurring at a distance of from 100 to 150 miles from the center, which is always in the direction in which its largest diameter lies and the appearance of the upper and lower clouds, enter as minor elements into the problem out of which the weather experts hope to work a complete system of tornado warnings.

The following is from the official statement of the earnings and expenses of the Union Pacific Railway for August: Earnings, \$2,321,135, a decrease of \$80,000 from the same month of last year; expenses and taxes \$1,307,181, an increase of \$24,000 from the same month of last year; net earnings, \$1,013,954, a decrease of \$22,148.

The Sydney, Australia, Herald announces the marriage of Dion Baucutt to Miss Thurdycy on September 9th. The Congress of the Socialist Labor Party was opened yesterday at Cincinnati by W. J. Roseberry, secretary of the national executive committee. About 70 delegates were present from 15 States of the country.

An Ottawa dispatch says: Mr. A. P. Low of the Theological Museum, has returned from his expedition to the Klamath Lake region. He has reported that he found that it was only 125 miles in length and from 15 to 20 miles in width.

An Atlanta, Ga., dispatch says: The large stables of C. L. Johnson, an extensive dairyman, were burned yesterday and 120 head of cattle perished in the flames. The most of these were fine red cows. Several hundred tons of hay were also destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$50,000, with only \$5,000 insurance.

A Tucson dispatch says: The United States and city in Arizona, who had been one week and is creating much excitement in ferreting out matters of public interest.
