

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRICAL.—Last night the comedy of the "Soldier's Daughter" was played to a slim house. Mr. Lindsay's "Governor Hothall" was a clever performance. So was Mr. Margetta's "Timothy Quaint," there was nothing else particularly worthy of notice.

TO-NIGHT Arrah-na-Pogue will be presented.

PROGRESS OF THE PRESIDENT'S PARTY.—Yesterday morning the President and company drove from Fillmore to Kanosh, where the people were assembled in expectation of a meeting. Seven discourses, brief and pointed, and eminently practical, were delivered by Elders Horace S. Eldredge, Joseph Young, Geo. Q. Cannon, Wilford Woodruff, B. Young, jr., and Presidents B. Young and D. H. Wells. Between Kanosh and Cove Creek, the roads are heavy in places, and it is estimated upon the company the latter part of the journey. The company reached Cove Creek at 5:30 p.m., and were warmly welcomed and excellently cared for by Brother Ira N. Hinkley and his family, quite a contrast between the present comfortable quarters for the company and their animals, and camping out without any shelter, as they had to in former times, when they stopped here for the night. The fort is a strong and commodious building, admirably adapted for the purpose designed, and is a credit to the Territory. Its location is commanding, and when first seen in the distance, it reminds one of the baronial castles of Europe. The company are all well, and though they have had storms for the past eight days, have suffered but little inconvenience, and no injury to their health. They left for Beaver at 8:50 this morning, where they will hold meetings at five this afternoon.

RIVERDALE.—G. G. R. Sangiovanni, late of the St. George Cactus, has for a time deserted the "flowery paths of literature," and, instead of supplying food for the mind, has established a restaurant at Riverdale, with the intention of purveying food for the body. He designates his hotel the "Red Flag Eating House," and informs us that he has already sprung into notoriety from the fact that a person named Valentine Grabenstein, from Kurhesser, Germany, who was putting up there, has been arrested for the late murder, and says "the evidences against him are so far very strong." The police are making every exertion to ferret out all particulars relating thereto.

CO-OPERATION IN THE 14TH WARD.—We dropped into the co-operative store of the 14th Ward this morning located in the Blazard Building a little west of the Eagle Emporium, and were pleased to learn that during the few days it has been open, the business done has been very satisfactory considering the wretched state of the weather during the greater portion of the week. Among the performers, vocal and instrumental, are the names of Bench, Baugh, Pugh, Coleman, Spokes, Napper, Jarvis, Green and others with whom many have joined in sweet fellowship in "the days of auld lang syne."




