Mining News.

On Saturday the notices of location of the "Pride of the West" and the "C" mines were filed with our county recorder by the locators, A. N. Alford, C. E. O'Neil, L. C. Thompson, and others. The mines are in Fishhook Hollow, in Blachman's Park canyon, Hyrum district, and were sold for \$5,000, the amount paid in costs and expenses by the locators.

A gold strike has been reported on High creek, about eight miles east of Richfield by Messrs Ben Piers and Peter Christensen. This cropping assay \$5 per ton in gold.

The Bluff mine, owned by H. R. Jensen and others, is in close proximity to the new strike. It is already in full blast, and the work is being worked out all there is to it. Mining experts have pronounced the Richmond district as among the most promising.

Attempted Suicide.

Mrs. Hansen was in Logan Friday night, and while there she and the others purchased the strychnine in one of the drugstores here with which she tried to end her mortal troubles. She is a young woman, and has been married but a short time. Her husband, Mr. Hansen, is now in Matlak at present. After taking the poison she repented her rash act and did all in her power to aid her friends in restoring her health. The others were surprised at doing. The Hansen's do not have a good character either in Hyrum or in Logan, her former home; she has been mixed up in several scandals of a very serious nature, and it is believed that she has been the cause of things concerning her, which he learned after marriage, and which he never suspected before.

Mr. Cooper was born and reared in the city of Ogallala, Nebraska, and exemplified only twenty years of age, and is mourned by a whole community. His remains reached home Friday and he was buried at Wellsville yesterday.

A twelve-year-old son of Principal F. H. Martin, of Wellsville, died yesterday morning, after suffering a long time from the effects of going in swimming too early in the season and remaining in the cold water too long.

C. of U., was the speaker at the Stake Tabernacle, and his theme was, "The Memorial Day." Rev. N. Hansen preached a memorial sermon in the Methodist church; his subject was, "The Voice of the Dead." Today the business houses and many of the pleasure seekers are down at the rear.
